NEW STAMPS RELEASED

Ram Vilas Paswan, Minister of Communications released a commemorative postage stamp on Chandragupta Maurya in the denomination of Rs.4 at Kanpur on July 21, 2001.

Chandragupta Maurya stands out as one among the most colorful personalities of Indian history. He was a far-sighted ruler, who not only expanded his territories, but also established a well-organized administrative system and gave it a sound financial base, thus laying the foundation for an enduring empire. Chandragupta Maurya had set a high ideal and is stated to have believed that his happiness lay in the happiness of his subjects and that in their troubles lay his troubles. Chandragupta's reign lasted for about 25 years. According to Jain tradition, he adopted Jainism, having been influenced by the saint Bhadrabahu. He is believed to have abdicated the throne in favor of his son Bindusara and pursued a spiritual life thereafter.

A commemorative postage stamp on Jhalkari Bai, in the denomination of Rs.4, was released by Ram Vilas Paswan, Minister of Communications at a function in Lucknow on July 22, 2001. The Uttar Pradesh Chief Minister, Rajnath Singh was the chief guest at the function.

The saga of Jhalkari Bai is illustrative of the seriousness of discontent among the common people against the colonial dominance and the extent of popular participation in the struggle. She was a courageous woman who came from a humble background and played a valiant role in the Jhansi theatre of the revolt of 1857. She is living memory in the folklore of the Bundelkhand region (which was part of the erstwhile state of Jhansi) even today. Jhalkari Bai bore an uncanny resemblance to Rani Lakshmi Bai, Queen of Jhansi, because of which the Queen took a special liking to her and inducted her into the women's wing of her army.

When discontent against the British policies was brewing, the people of Jhansi rallied around the Queen and resolved to take up arms to uphold the independence of their state. In 1858, there were several attacks on the Jhansi fort by the British and their native allies. Though the recorded

history does not reveal much about the antecedents or heroic exploits of Jhalkari Bai, the everloyal Jhalkari Bai must have been a pillar of strength for the queen in those trying times. It is said that when the fall of the fortress became imminent, Jhalkari Bai and some generals convinced Lakshmi Bai to escape quietly with a handful of supporters. In a ploy to deceive the British, Jhalkari dressed up like the Rani and took command of the army. The British found out the truth but it was too late, as the Queen had covered a considerable distance by then. Though Jhalkari Bai was forced to surrender, it is believed that the British military officers, who were impressed by her loyalty, courage and fighting prowess treated her with respect and freed her.

NOTES ON NEW SPECIAL DEFINITIVE SERIES

Special definitive series in 25-paisa denomination were first issued with the motifs of Mahatma Gandhi and Pandit Nehru in 1976 and the Mahatma Gandhi series continued till 2000 in the 100-paisa denomination. With the introduction of the new definitive series on Natural Heritage in the year 2000, India Post also issued a new series of three Special Definitive Stamps.

The Special Definitive Stamps are issued in sheets of $10 \times 10 = 100$ stamps per sheet. The Stamps are printed by photogravure process on multiple Ashoka Capital watermarked paper by India Security Press, Nashik Road. The normal position for watermark is upright. The printed sheet contains four panes that are cut after printing to make issued sheets. Serial numbers, date, month & year of printing have been found on this stamp till date. The marginal inscriptions on a sheet contain the name of the press in Hindi & English and the cylinder number in one line. Every denomination is assigned a letter that precedes the cylinder number.

The first Stamp in this series was issued on October 31, 2000 on the Iron man of India, Sardar Vallabhai Patel in the denomination of Rs. 2. It is a vertical design in Grey colour. "J" is the letter assigned for this denomination. The marginal inscription is "I.S.P. Nashik-Road J1", in capital letters and has been seen on the left margin of the sheet followed by "J2" on the left and right of the sheet. "J3" on the left and right of the sheet. The left inscription of "J4" has a colour band on top of the sheet printed in gray colour. "J4" is also seen on the right side. "J5" is also seen with the inscription on the left and right of the sheet. The right inscription of "J5" also has a sheet number 029173 on the top right hand corner. The left inscription of "J7" has been seen with four different printing dates, those are .5.II.01, .6.II.01 and 14.III.01, .3.V.01. "J7" on the left side has the sheet number 415841 printed, and "J7" is also seen on the right side. "J8" is also seen with the sheet number 252627 on the left side, and it is also seen on the right side.

The second Stamp in the Special Definitive Series was issued on January 23, 2001 on the founder of the Indian National Army in Singapore Netaji Subash Chandra Bose in the denomination of Rs. 1. It is a vertical design in Orange Brown colour. "F" is the letter assigned for this denomination. The marginal inscription is "I.S.P. Nashik-Road F2", in capital letters and has been seen on the left margin of the sheet followed by "F3" also seen on the left, margin of the sheet. Sheet Number "F4" has been sighted with the left inscription sheet number 101248 and

date of printing as 24.I.01, another "F4" sheet has been sight without the date of printing or sheet number.

The third Stamp in the Special Definitive Series was issued on April 14, 2001 on Dr. B.R. Ambedkar in the denomination of Rs. 3. It is a vertical design in Greenish Grey colour. "A" is the letter assigned for this denomination. The marginal inscription is "I.S.P. Nashik-Road A1", in capital letters and has been seen on the right margin of the sheet followed by "A3" seen on the left and right margin of the sheet.

Readers having more information on marginal inscriptions and cylinder numbers of any denomination are requested to contribute.

STANLEY GIBBONS ANNOUNCES DIGITAL CATALOGUES

Stanley Gibbons plans to release a major series of 'bespoke' digital stamp catalogues, which the company sees as a publishing innovation for the entire Stanley Gibbons catalogue publishing operation.

Their 'one country' digital catalogues will mean that philatelists no longer will have to buy a bulky catalogue containing some information they have little use for. In the future, collectors will be able to buy 'Malta', 'Argentina', 'Germany, 'Canada' or any other country they want as individual volumes.

"It's all about increasing choice and giving value for money," says SG production manager David Hardy, "The new digital 'one country' catalogue range will be both flexible and functional."

Final details are yet to be confirmed, but the new 'one country' series is expected to be launched with 'Australia' sometime in late August 2001. Because the Australia catalogue is one of the largest in the new series, the cover price will be around £12.95, and it's expected that other volumes will retail for as little as £8.95. Australia will be followed by Canada, New Zealand, Cyprus, Malta and Gibraltar.

The format of the new 'one catalogue' series is also innovative and exciting. Each set of pages will be printed on high quality cartridge paper and will be attractively housed in a specially designed four ring binder.

Individual volumes will come complete with general information pages, other vital philatelic information, and discount coupons for the other catalogues in the series.

Stanley Gibbons is keen to stress that the regular production of their standard printed catalogues will continue for the foreseeable future.

MORE AIR SERVICE IN THE COUNTRY

June 2, 1954, Lahore: The frequency of air service between Lahore and Karachi will be raised from three to five services a week from June 7, 1954.

From this date there will be two Convair services between Lahore and Dacca instead of one at present.

There will, however, be no service on Karachi – Lahore route on Thursday and Sundays.

The additional service on Lahore – Dacca route will be on Wednesday and the present Sunday service on the same route will now be changed over to Saturdays.

Karachi – Peshawar service via Lahore will remain twice a week as at present.

Pakistan is likely to open a new service on Lahore – Delhi route as soon as nationalization is complete.

PIA ANNOUNCES ITS INLAND NON - STOP SERVICE

PIA announced its Inland non-stop Super Constellation service between Karachi and Dacca from Monday, June 7, 1954.

The days of operation of all services originating from Karachi are being changed with effect from Monday the 7th June 1954.

CRESCENT AIRWAYS DAKOTA CRASHES - NO LOSS OF LIFE

A Dakota freighter of the Crescent Airways crashed into an earth mound off the runway at Dacca Airport today (July 8, 1954) while attempting to take off for Karachi.

There were no passengers. All four members of the crew are safe. The aircraft is understood to have been severely damaged.

AVINASH B. JAGTAP, BINNINGEN (SWITZERLAND) 21 JULY 2001 15:35

In the recent Newsletter No. 45 (19 July 2001) Mr. Mansoor Bolar has expressed his views on the revised Indian postal charges. I also find it ridiculous that a sender of a letter has to pay double the amount if his (or her) letter should weigh more than standard 20 g. I also agree with the proposal of Mr. Bolar that there should be "smaller slabs" for the extra postage to be paid for over-weight letters. One Rupee for every extra 5 grams. But I also think that for the man at the counter it is very easy to decide if a letter is within 20 g or more and he is not obliged to weight every increase of 5 gms which will determine the ultimate postage. Taking into consideration the volume of letters which the post office has to handle India Post is undoubtedly going to save much work and time of the postal worker who weighs letters and I doubt if balances in post offices are that accurate to determine every extra 5 gms!

I have come across some issues of stamps released at the end of 1999 and beginning of 2000, where the paper & the colors the stamps are majorly different. All these stamps were printed by India Security Press. The stamps are: 1) UPU 4 values (1999) 2) Sri Satya Sai water supply project (1999) 3) The Hindustan Times (1999) 4) Family Planning Association of India (1999) 5) Jesus Christ (1999) 6) Tabo Monastery (1999) 7) Millennium Sunrise (2000) 8) 50 years of Republic of India- Gallantry Awardees (2000) 9) Endangered Species-Turtles (2000) I came to know that the press in Nasik was shut for some time due to technical problems and after the press was re-started, the above stamps were printed. When this (re) printing happened, all the stamps were printed on different paper. Also the ink is glossy and bright. Does this classify as reprinting of commemorative stamps?
