JHINGANS JOTTINGS

Hi

In August 2002 we will complete two years of emailing this, the country's first registered electronic magazine. We have used most of the Internet Service Providers (ISPs) that operate in India during this period. We thought we could keep up with the changes having been computer users since card punching days and email users for over 10 years. However we have had to change ISPs due to the service deficiencies and or unavailability of services to avail the most suitable service at a given time. The wonderful new technologies bring woeful new problems.

Without boring you with history we recount our experiences with some of the ISP's - 'Satyam' used to deliver bulk mail after several days and 'Mantra on Line' also used to do the same. It was the age-old business principal that 'bus will leave when it is full' applied to emails. The mail server was not always online but intermittently to send and receive emails. Recent experience shows that now 'Mantra on Line' simply does not deliver bulk mail. These companies, however, do not bother to inform the customer, in this age of wanting to exceed

customer expectation. What is perhaps even worse is the fact that there are no returned mails. This happens only in India!!

On the other hand we did several mailings thru 'NOW' that is a fairly large ISP without much problem. We also did not face problems with mailings thru government owned mega corporations 'VSNL' and 'MTNL' either. VSNL was basically the Overseas Communications Service that launched the Internet in India.

We had large number of returns of undelivered mail while using 'Bharat Connect'. Investigating the matter we learned that several networks were not accepting any mail at all from 'Bharat Connect' because this ISP allowed use of their mail server without being connected thru them. This is considered a poor security situation. When an email reaches an email server, it is usually checked to see if it is coming from an open relay email server. Usually the Open Relay Database compiled by <http://ordb.org/> is used for this purpose. If the email comes from an open relay, it is automatically bounced back to the sender. An Open Relay server is a mail server that accepts email from anyone including spammers, sending unsolicited e-mail and then sends it to its destination. Spammers like to use Open Relay servers since it hides their trail. ISPs who have Open Relay servers get included in the ORDB database i.e. they are blacklisted. The ISPs then need to put the proper fixes in place to be delisted.

This week we received an auto response from one of the subscribers " I regret that my email address now receives so much spam mail that I have decided to terminate this account. Those whose messages I respond to will have my new address and to the others - happy hunting!"

Earlier in April this year a subscriber informed us "that the same time as the newsletter arrived this morning I received a spam from someone using your mailing list. You may want to check into what appears to be a misuse of your facilities."

Unsolicited e-mails seem to be an international phenomenon, in fact most of our own addresses seem to have been compromised. After the change in services from free to a mostly paid one since April 24, 2002 the yahoo email account attracts 15 to 20 unsolicited e-mails a day. The situation was not that bad earlier. But it is our email id at Tatanova, our current ISP that is really worrying us. Other funny things with Tatanova are their connectivity with VSNL that they have recently purchased and their inability to deliver to ".int" addresses. There are unusually high returns from mailings to subscribers at VSNL network. And for some inexplicable reason all e-mails sent to ".int" addresses used by UN and other international organizations seem to come back to the sender.

Well, here is to technology, hoping that it will bring more joy than sorrow.

ANOTHER PREMATURE RELEASE

Another commemorative stamp is found used before the official release. The stamp in the denomination of Rs. 4 is on Anna Sathe with postmark of May 22, 2002. The date of issue of this stamp is yet to be fixed by India Post.

NEW DATE FOR P L DESHPANDE

India Post's next stamp issue in the denomination of Rs. 4 on P L Deshpande is now rescheduled for June 16, 2002.

The stamp shall be produced in the quantity of 400,000 only. The stamp along with the First Day Covers and the information sheets, at Rs. 2 each, shall be available on sale at nearly 1000 selected Post Offices including all Philatelic Bureaus and Counters.

WORLD CUP FOOTBALL PHILATELIC EXHIBITION

Almost all five star and other hotels all over the world are busy doing World Cup promotions of various kinds. Le Meridien at New Delhi organized a philatelic exhibition on football in cooperation with Olympic Philatelists of India. The Ambassador of the France in India, Bernard de Montferrand inaugurated it on May 31, 2002.

NEPAL WORLD CUP ISSUE

A postage stamp in the denomination of Rs. 15 was issued on May 31, 2002 to commemorate the first 17th World Cup football and depicts the logo, the golden trophy of the world cup, and a player playing football. Austrian Government Printing Office, Vienna, Austria produced the stamp designed by K. K. Karmacharya, in four colors by offset lithography in the sheets of 50 stamps. The quantity printed is 0.5 million.

NEW PRESIDENT OF INDIA STUDY CIRCLE

Max Smith was elected President for a two-year term during the Annual General Meeting of the India Study Circle for Philately in May 2002.

The new location for monthly meetings at London shall now be, Royal Philatelic Society, Devonshire Place, London W1 effective September 2002, with the exception of the October 2002 Grand Auction.

On January 1, 2002 the Gujarat Philatelic Association (GPA) turned 30. This was celebrated in style by organizing a special function on February 3, 2002 at Ahmedabad. RARE INDIA FIND

Jeff Siddiqui of USA has found the rare Queen Victoria Letter Sheet issued in 1857 with an oval printer's mark in colorless embossing - "Under ¼ Tola/ de La Rue & Co.". Derek Lang notes in his 'British India Postal Stationery' that "This is extremely rare and only one copy has been reliably recorded to date". The complete story is published in May 2002 issue of the American Philatelist.

The same issue of the American Philatelist also has the article 'Bangladesh Honors the Universal Postal Union' by Parvez Ali Anwar Khan that lists and illustrates several special postmarks in addition to stamps and miniature sheets.

Anil Suri wrote "I must thank you for giving space for my correspondence with PCI President and Secretary General in your issue # 66. I wish to reiterate the fact that one is blacklisted if one questions their doings. Especially if the questions are inconvenient and their doings are not disclosed to the general membership or even to the governing council members. In my case non-acceptance of my exhibits at five exhibitions in a row was not coincidence. It was Dilip Shah who as Secretary General ordered the commissioners not to process or recommend my exhibits. The records of the concerned exhibitions could easily verify this. One of the commissioners apprised me of the fact and then only I started the correspondence quoted in your report. As you can see I failed to elicit any coherent or to the point answer from these Leaders of Philately in India. Merit does not seem to merit an entry in international philatelic exhibitions."

PRASHANT H. PANDYA FROM VADODARA

Small Packet Rate for foreign countries was introduced in India in February 1999. Rates for which are available in Postal Information books published by Postal Training Centre and also it is available in the computer programme of post office. Unfortunately conditions for booking of Small Packet is not available with post office.

In foreign countries the system of Small Packet probably exists since long time. The small packet classification offers a convenient and economical way to mail certain items like gifts, photographs, audio/video tapes, trade samples, Merchandise items, coins, precious metals, jewellery, valuable stones etc. Personal correspondence is not allowed in Small Packets. They can be sent by Air or Surface, Registered or Unregistered.

Here in post office, postal clerks do not know the conditions for booking the small packet and hence either they are refusing such articles or ask to keep the packet open (like book post article)

I request you to publish this matter in your weekly newsletter "Stamps Of India Collectors' Companion", so readers can know about this service and can help me to find out requisite conditions for booking "Small Packet Rate Articles"

INVERTED & MISSING CENTERS AND THE MILLIONS

A collector's dream came true in December 2001 with the discovery of a rare error on a US stamp. The collector in Texas bought a sheet of 40 stamps, issued to commemorate the bicentennial of New York Stock Exchange, from the post office in 1992. Much later the owner discovered that the sheet contained 28 stamps with inverted centers and 12 with completely missing centers - two errors on one sheet. The U.S. Postal Service and other professional stamp experts have verified the authenticity of this error sheet.

Realizing the potential of his discovery, the owner contacted Greg Manning Auctions in New York, one of the top firms for auctioning stamps, coins, sports cards and other collectibles. The auction will take place June 16 at the Plaza Hotel in New York City where the estimate that we have published in the catalog is \$400,000-\$600,000. The stamps will be auctioned in singles, pairs and blocks. The entire sheet intact is an option should a bidder make an offer greater than the sum of its parts.

Manning says "This discovery is, without a doubt, the most important stamp-collecting event of the 21st century and is a wonderful opportunity for the thousands of new philatelists around the world to share its experience. A portion of the auction's proceeds will go to

charity with a directed share to a fund for the families of the victims of the Sept. 11 attacks."

And this particular auction in addition to being a floor auction will be broadcast on eBay live simultaneously with the floor auction, and 42 million people, eBay-registered users, will see the action.

RESEARCH NOTES

INDIAN POSTAL ORDERS, Part 2

The second set of 4 denominations was issue in 1937 and depicted King George VI. The denominations and the prefixes were same as the first set.

In the year 1938 the Design of Re. 1 postal order was revised. The prefix for this issue was changed to 'E' from the regular 'B' for this denomination.

On April 1, 1939 a set of 20 postal orders with 16 new denominations was issued. There was a denomination at every half Rupee or Annas 8. The denominations now were As 8, Re 1, Rs 1 & As 8, Rs 2, Rs 2 & As 8, Rs 3, Rs 3 & As 8, Rs 4, Rs 4 & As 8, Rs 5, Rs 5 & As 8, Rs 6, Rs 6 & As 8, Rs 7, Rs 7 & As 8, Rs 8, Rs 8 & As 8, Rs 9, Rs 9 & As 8, and Rs 10. The serial numbers were prefixed by 'A', 'B', 'C', 'D', 'E', 'F', 'G', 'H', 'J', 'K', 'L', 'M', 'N', 'P', 'Q', 'R', 'S', 'T', 'V', and 'W' respectively. As you can see letters 'I', 'O', and 'U' were not used for prefixes. We can understand not using 'I' and 'O' as it could be confused with numerical one and zero respectively. But why leave 'U'? Perhaps to complete the expression I O U!!!

On December 15, 1944 many denominations were surcharged by overprinting as follows:

- As. 8 on
- Rs.5 & As 8, Rs.6 & As 8, Rs.7 & As 8, Rs.8 & As 8, and Rs.9 & As 8
- Re. 1 on
- Rs.6, and Rs.7
- Rs. 5 on
- Rs.8, and Rs.9

This issue was the last issue of Indian Postal Orders before independence.
