NEWS & ANNOUNCEMENTS

SREE THAKUR SATYANANDA

The Minister of State for Communications & Information Technology, Dr. Sanjay Paswan released a commemorative stamp on philosopher, writer and poet Sree Thakur Satyananda, on July 23, 2002 at a function held at Kolkata.

The stamp is in the denomination of Rs. 5, the inland letter rate. Alka Sharma designed the stamp, the First Day Cover, and the pictorial first day postmark. Information Sheet containing write-up and technical data, and the First Day Cover, each priced at Rs. 2 were issued on the occasion. Calcutta Security Printers Limited of Kanpur printed the stamps by photo Offset in four colors on matt chromo paper in the quantity of 0.4 million each. The issued sheets contain 40 stamps.

INDIAN PARTICIPATION IN PHILAKOREA 2002

India Post will not be participating in PHILAKOREA 2002 world stamp exhibition being held from August 2 to 11, 2002 at Seoul. India Post had booked a Sales booth and planned a Special Postmark. Some of the senior postal officers would have also attended the show. However the Minister's office, it is reliably learned, turned down the proposal for undisclosed reasons.

It was important for India Post to have attended this show, as this is not only the sole FIP World General exhibition in 2002 but is also the venue for 67th FIP Congress where India's application for a world exhibition in 2004 will come up for discussion and decision. India Post will be celebrating 150 years of the first postage stamps as well as 150 years of the establishment of the Office of the Director General of Post. Both these were outcome of the enactment of the Indian Post Office Act of 1854.

The situation about the exhibits is still uncertain and it is not known if all exhibits from India will be participating.

ABN AMRO BANK CUSTOMIZED PSE

India Post's third customized pre-stamped envelope (PSE) for ABN AMRO BANK was released on July 11, 2002 at New Delhi. The imprinted stamp depicts 'Live Without Fear' from their ad artwork for 'Freedom Credit Card' and inscribed 'postage pre-paid for Rs. 5'. The envelope is in the size of 220 x 110 mm. This is the first window envelope. This issue is NOT available to public or philatelists through the Post Office.

India Post has on offer 10 sizes of customized envelopes, in three varieties of the paper viz. 80, 90, and 100 GSM, for Rs. 1.50 to Rs. 2.30 each. In addition the client may choose the amount of postage prepaid - Rs. 5 for inland letter rate, Rs. 15 for overseas airmail letter rate, Rs. 22 for inland registered mail, as per their requirements. The sizes available are, in mm - 140 x 90, 152 x 90, 162 x 114, 180 x 135, 176 x 125, 220 x 110, 240 x 120, 229 x 162, 230 x 160, and A4. The stamp design on PSE is exact replica of the card design and appropriately depicts the idol of Lord Ganesha. The imprinted stamp is in the denomination of Rs. 4.

TECHNOLOGY FROM ISRAEL TO FIGHT THE FAKES

To check the duplication of adhesive stamp papers, the Maharashtra government is considering the use of Latent Image Technology (LIT) from Israel. The state government has already communicated its desire to the Central government and India Security Press at Nashik for the use of the technology. The state protocol department is currently using this technology on special passes provided for VIP vehicles.

LIT is based on the radiation chemistry of polymers, in which chemical and radiation treatment create latent images in transparent polymer films. The images, though completely invisible to the naked eye, become visible when seen through a standard polariser.

According to Rajesh Awchat, of R L Awchat and Associates, an authorized distributor of LIT products in India, the high-resolution images are highly stable and impossible to imitate or falsify. "Though it is slightly more expensive than other measures, such as holograms, the technology is completely foolproof. It could be used to prevent duplication of mark sheets, degree certificates, excise labels and so on. It is currently being used in the US, Japan, Israel and several other countries," he said.

The Rs 2,200 crore fake stamp paper scam, exposed by the Pune police recently, shook the government and forced it to stop selling adhesive stamps.

PHILATELY IN TRANSITION IN INDIA, Part 18

We had long ago identified a malady and named it "Dharamsala Syndrome". It related so well to the philatelic scenario that it had been subject matter of several of our philatelic talks but finds mentions in print here for the very first time.

'Dharamsala' is a charitable institution more often than not attached to a religious institution such as a temple. It provides no-frills boarding and lodging to pilgrims, and others either free or on nominal charges. Such institutions are common also in several Asian countries including Japan and Korea.

We have observed a strange phenomenon in India. The persons who are on board of management of such institutions take their duties towards these very lightly and at the lowest priority possible. They do not feel any responsibility towards any one and show an absence of any

professionalism whatsoever. However when it comes to their individual vocations in life they have plenty of time, are focused, prepared and thoroughly professional. The malady only surfaces towards their duties in non-profit institutions.

Most officers of philatelic organizations in India are suffering from Dharamsala Syndrome. Now that we do know the patients, can you suggest some remedies?

As northeast region of India is famous for orchids there is a chance of such a postmark. I would also like to know if there is a book or reference material on all the permanent pictorial cancellations of India till date.

Firstly I wish to commend the two of you for coming out with your delightful and information filled newsletter on such a regular basis. Even though you were facing (it looked to me) immense web and e-mail problems you have persisted and that too for no monetary benefit.

I am writing to ask you the issue date of a couple of definitive issues. I have checked all the resources known to me, like the Phila Catalogue, SG catalogue, Post Office published book, stuff on the net and so on. But no release date seems to exist for the stamps I am asking the dates for.

The date I want to know is for the map of India series as mentioned below;

- 1959 Map of India ashoka wmk 50,75 both paise 1Re, 2Rs, 5Rs, 10Rs
- 1960 Map of India ashoka wmk 1,15,90 all paise
- 1963 Map of India ashoka wmk 6,13 both paise

Regarding the new VIII definitive series, I want to know if they encompass both the wild life and famous leaders being issued since 2000. Or if the famous leaders are part of a special definitive series.

#### RESEARCH NOTES

#### PIN CODE

Germany was the first country in the world to introduce a numerical postal address code in 1961 to aid mechanized sorting. On August 15,

1972 India became the 19<sup>th</sup> country in the world to adopt a similar system with the introduction of PIN Code.

Postal Index Number (PIN) is a 6-digit code. There are 8 PIN regions in the country. The first digit indicates one of the regions. The first 2 digits together indicate the sub region or one of the postal circles. The first 3 digits together indicate a sorting / revenue district. The last 3 digits refer to the delivery Post Office.

First Digit - Region - States Covered

- 1 - Northern - Delhi, Haryana, Punjab, Himachal Pradesh, Jammu & Kashmir
- 2 - Northern - Uttar Pradesh, and Uttaranchal
- 3 - Western - Rajasthan, and Gujarat
- 4 - Western - Chattisgarh, Maharastra, and Madhya Pradesh
- 5 - Southern - Andhra Pradesh, and Karnataka
- 6 - Southern - Kerala, and Tamil Nadu
- 7 - Eastern - West Bengal, Orissa, and North Eastern States
- 8 - Eastern - Bihar, and Jharkand

This digital code eased the problem of sorting mail. Especially as there are several languages and scripts as well as several different towns having the same name in India.

India Post has been publishing All India Pin Code Directories periodically and these have been available at post offices for sale to the public. We note the following editions:

- 1973 - Print Line 1974 - Price Rs. 2.15
- 1973 (Reprint) - Print Line 1975 - Rs. 1.75
- 1981 - Price Rs. 3.50 (Corrected in manuscript from 0.50)
- 1982 - (1983) - Price not indicated
- 1985 - Rs. 7
- 2000 - Rs. 40 (hand stamped)

We request our readers to look at their holdings and report other editions of the All India Pin Code Directories.

Contrary to popular belief the PIN codes have been added, deleted, and changed during last 30 years. Armed with this information it will be quite a challenge to obtain postmarks showing different PIN Codes for the same post office.

India Post's web site <http://www.indiapost.org> provides a search engine for PIN Codes. By entering the name of a town it provides the PIN Code for the same. And more interestingly one can find out the name of the town by entering the PIN Code.
