AMARNATH YATRA TRAVELING POST OFFICE

Amarnath cave, situated in a narrow gorge at the far end of the Lidder valley at the altitude of 3,888 meters, is 141 kilometers away from Srinagar in Jammu & Kashmir. There lies the ice lingam of Lord Shiva that is formed naturally of an ice stalagmite, which waxes and wanes with the moon.

The pilgrims in large number trek to the cave during the Sawan month of the Hindu calendar. The trek is covered in four days, with night halts at Chandanwari, Sheshnag (Wawjan), and Panjtarni. The state government has to restrict the number of pilgrims keeping in view the space and facilities available. This year about 200,000 pilgrims are expected to trek to Amaranth between July 11 and Aug 12, 2003.

India Post has been providing the postal facilities to the pilgrims on way to Amaranth through a temporary traveling post office since mid 1950s. The mail from this post office is quite scarce and we suggest all our readers to make an effort to obtain some covers even if they personally don't collect this kind of material.

India Post provided a special postmark to commemorate 100 years of the Mechanical Workshop of North Eastern Railway Gorakhpur on June 4, 2003 at Gorakhpur. A special cover was also released on this occasion.

HIGH LEVEL OFFICIALS MEET ON FAKE STAMPS SCAM

The Government of India has estimated a loss of a whopping Rs.300 billion due to the rampant use of fake stamps in the country. A review of the magnitude of the scam and the need for urgent remedial measures was taken on July 9, 2003 at a high-level meeting chaired by India's Home Secretary, N Gopalaswami, at New Delhi. The meeting was attended by chief secretaries and police chiefs of several states as well as the heads of Central Bureau of Investigation (CBI) and Intelligence Bureau (IB).

Interestingly, Government agencies are in agreement on how members of the underworld have taken to forging stamps in a big way and are pumping the proceeds for financing films and purchasing property.

CBI chief P C Sharma says that 'Printing fake stamp paper seems to have become a lucrative activity for the underworld. Several security measures need to be adopted and the problem needs to be tackled on a war footing'. The CBI chief said that following stamp paper frauds detected by Delhi Police, they were soon going to register cases against persons who had printed fake paper worth over Rs.2 billion in New Delhi. Besides this, several cases have been registered by police in Maharashtra, Karnataka, Andhra, Bihar and Uttar Pradesh.

It has been decided that besides beefing up controls at security presses, some improvements and administrative measures need to be taken by the Central and state governments.

The IB which had done a detailed study on fake currency notes has now been asked to examine the nexus between the underworld and fake stamp sales.

INTERNATIONAL POSTAGE STAMP DESIGN CONTEST

Korea Post is organizing an International Postage Stamp Design Contest. There are two categories, Youth (under 17 years of age) and General with two themes each. The themes for the Youth are - Space Science (Space

Exploration) and Bio-Science (The Mysteries of Life) and for the General are - FIFA (International Federation of Football Associations)
Centennial and 12th World Water Day.

The entry forms may be downloaded from $\underline{www.koreapost.go.kr}$ and should be submitted by September 17, 2003 with the design in the size of 15x20cm that must be attached on the front of A4 size hardboard with the form on the back.

Judges selected from experts in Fine Arts, postage stamps, design, and other disciplines will evaluate the entries during October 2003 with the award ceremony scheduled for November 2003.

There are over Won 13 million (Rs. 500,000 or US\$100,000) worth of awards to be won and the four Grand Prize winning entries are expected to be used on Korean postage stamps in 2004.

PHILATELY IN TRANSITION IN INDIA, Part 61

Umesh Kakkeri from Mumbai sent the following message on July 13, 2003: "Since last few issues you have stopped the PCI cases update. Please let us know exactly what has happened or what is going on in these cases. The fight that was going on is still on or stopped? Or is there any other reason for not publishing about it. Please do incorporate the news regarding PCI cases in every issue of your journal, even though the case may have been adjourned for the next hearing, to keep the matter alive."

In our meetings with PCI members all over the country, institutional as well as individual, we find that there is very little or no information available with them regarding the past history and current activities of the PCI.

Some say that PCI members themselves are responsible for this state of affairs as people get the government they deserve. If a small group of self-centered individuals, better known as P Company, controls all the affairs of PCI in gross violation of democratic norms and legal provisions, it is so because the members inadvertently allowed it to happen. Members either did not take interest in the affairs or were afraid that if they question any member of the P Company they will not be included in the distribution of medals and offices of profit. There is an ancient Indian saying 'silence is a sign of approval' (maunam sweekriti lakshnam). Emboldened by this silence, the P Company has falsely been claiming sole representation of philately in India and of Indian philately in international forums.

The way PCI has been run from its very inception as a private business; it is not surprising that members do not have a sense of belonging that is so essential in an active organization. Several well known philatelists preferred giving up philately in disgust instead of stooping low to match the activities of the P Company is a matter of record.

Now this may appear as 'whether chicken came first or the egg' kind of problem - whether the members of PCI or the P Company is to be blamed for allowing mismanagement to happen. Whether the members were not sufficiently vigilant or the P Company hijacked the controls.

We have been updating our readers on a regular basis regarding the activities of PCI and would continue to do so in the forthcoming issues as well.

A society is the sum total of its members and every member's action and inaction affects the society. We believe that it is time for every member to introspect and interact with other members to decide how they want their society to be.

I have in my collection the following missing pearl stamps of Br. India: KGV Single Star Watermark Re.1, Re.1 (service) and Rs.2 KGV Multi-Star Watermark Re.1 (service), Rs.2 and Rs.2 (service), and Re.1 (BAHRAIN),

KGVI Rs.2, Rs.2 (service), Rs.2 (BAHRAIN), Rs.2 (OMAN), Rs.2 (JIND), Rs.5 (service), Rs.15 (BAHRAIN on inverted watermark).

For simplicity's sake, I have not broken out some of the above which also exist with missing pearls on TWO different locations like KGVI Rs. 2. Additionally, I have damaged (disappearing) pearl varieties on most of the above plus KGVI Rs.10.

MICHEL RUNDSCHAU'S STAMP SURVEY 2001

'Michel' of Germany needs no introduction to philatelists as they are a household name being the publisher of worldwide stamp catalogs. 'Michel' also publish a monthly magazine 'Michel Rundschau' that has regularly been reporting in December issue every year a survey of stamps issued in the preceding year. However the survey for issues of 2001 was delayed to April 2003 issue.

According to the survey of 2001, 273 countries and territories issued 13879 stamps, including 1302 miniature sheets. The total face value exceeds over Rs.0.5 million. However this is lower than previous year when a record 17544 stamps, including 1595 miniature sheets, were issued.

The top ten countries with highest number of issues are along expected lines: Grenada 680, Liberia 571, Gambia 481, St. Vincent 386, Sierra Leone 350, Guyana 298, Japan 286, Guinea 262, Antigua & Barbuda 246, and Dominica 221. The face value of the complete year of issues of Grenada in 2001 exceeds Rs.30000.

The ranking for some of the leading stamp issuing countries was as follows USA with 155 stamps ranked $17^{\rm th}$ in the list, Australia with 139 was #19, France with 134 was #21, South Africa with 120 was #25, China with 109 was #27, New Zealand with 107 was #28, and Great Britain with 106 was #29.

In 1971 the total number of issues was about 8800, in 1981 it was 7666, and in 1991 it reached 10448.
