The VSC was then a part of GEnie's Stamp Collecting Round Table, and it became the world's first electronic chapter of a major stamp collecting organization. Since then, the VSC has resided on GEnie, America Online, the Microsoft Network, Dueling Modems Stamps and Delphi (often on more than one service at a time); on text-only dial-up services and the World Wide Web; from 2500 potential topics to hundreds of pages on the Web, chats, and an active message board.

We congratulate Lloyd de Vries, the founder President of VSC, and also Secretary of the American Philatelic Society.

We also plan to mark the $10^{\rm th}$ anniversary of the first virtual stamp club in the world with the launch of another virtual stamp club - "Stamps of India Collectors Club" that will be the first virtual stamp club in India. The details will follow in the forthcoming issues based on your ideas and suggestions.

OLYMPHILEX 2004

World Olympic -Sports Stamp, Coins and Memorabilia Exhibition, OLYMPHILEX 2004 will be held concurrently with the Games of the XXVIII Olympiad from August 12 to 22, 2004 in Athens. The venue of the exhibition, European Exhibition and Promotion Centre, will have 1000 frames in 3,000 square meters space.

The Hellenic Post is organizing OLYMPHILEX 2004 with the cooperation of the Hellenic Philatelic Federation and the support of the Hellenic Union of Olympic and Sports Philately under the patronage of the International Olympic Committee and the International Federation of Olympic Philately [FIPO]. The event is taking place under the auspices of the International Philatelic Federation (FIP).

OLYMPHILEX 2004 is the first world philatelic exhibition to utilize internet as the sole medium for communication. No Bulletin with the appropriate Regulations as customary was published as these were published on the internet and circulated to the respective Commissioners. All correspondence, entry forms of exhibitors, application forms for booths' rent by Postal Authorities or stamp dealers is entirely carried out by internet. So far, the experiment is very rewarding and sooner or later the experience gained will help future organizers of International Exhibitions.

Although the Exhibition will open its doors to the public on the 12th of August, the official opening is planned for 16th of August, in order members of the Government, officials of the International Olympic Committee and of the Olympic Games 2004, Greek Olympic winners etc. would be able to attend.

India has not appointed any commissioner for OLYMPHILEX 2004 and the last date for participation was May 20, 2004. However those wishing to participate may immediately download the rules and entry form and email the duly filled form back to organizers. The participation is free.

SPECIAL PLACE POSTMARKS REINTRODUCED

We are pleased to report, albeit belatedly, that for the stamp issued on June 2, 2004 to commemorate the 150 years of Woodstock School, Mussoorie a special place postmark was provided at the school premises. This is the first special place postmark in recent times and we welcome this move of India Post.

The first day cover postmark can be provided on the first day covers for a period of four weeks from the date of release as per order dated May 8, 2004 by Devika Kumar, Deputy Director General, Philatelic Division, India Post. Those who wish to have this postmark may send their request before June 29, 2004 to Chief Post Master General, Uttaranchal Circle, Dehradun 248001.

OLYMPIC TORCH IN NEW DELHI

New Delhi was the sixth international stop of the ATHENS 2004 Olympic Torch Relay on June 10, 2004. This was $2^{\rm nd}$ time the Olympic torch came to India, the first was in 1964. ATHENS 2004 Olympic Torch Relay will cover 34 cities in 27 countries in all 5 continents and its theme appropriately is "Pass the Flame, Unite the World".

The Torch Relay began at the Qutab Minar, site of the medieval settlements of Delhi, to the sounds of the Taal Vaidyam, a performance of percussion instruments from the temples of South India, traditionally played to mark the beginning of an auspicious event. Delhi Chief Minister Shiela Dixit handed over the Torch to the first torchbearer, Suresh Kalmadi (President of the Indian Olympic Association). Among other celebrations, there was music from the desert regions of Rajasthan at the Humayun's Tomb, and a re-enactment of the centuries old kite festival at the Red Fort. A procession of bedecked elephants and camels escorted torchbearers down the majestic RajPath. The grand finale at the National Stadium included a fusion of the traditional and the modern as the myriad colors of Indian culture from across the country came into play.

FAKE STAMP SCAM UPDATES

On June 10, 2004 Metropolitan magistrate, Delhi, V K Khanna remanded Telgi to CBI custody till June 23, 2004 after special public prosecutor J S Wadia submitted that he had to be taken back to Yervada jail in Pune, by June 25. This was to enable his production before a MCOCA court in Pune on June 26, he added. The investigating agency had sought his custody claiming that Telgi had to be interrogated in connection with the recovery of fake stamp papers worth Rs 2.2 billion from Delhi almost two years ago. Wadia said two of the accused in the case which was registered at the Hauz Khas police station, had alleged Telgi's involvement.

USA DIWALI STAMP

Dr Shailendra Kumar, president of the Committee for Diwali Postage Stamp, and Dr Piyush Agrawal, past President of the Association of Indians in America (AIA), are submitting a new proposal to the U S Postal Service to formally request the issuance of a Diwali stamp.

A past proposal fell through because of the low number of petitions.

Organizers have so far won the support of U S Congressman Joe Wilson (R-S C), who is urging all Hindus to begin a letter-writing campaign in support of the proposal.

The new campaign calls for Hindus to send a letter advocating the plan to: Dr. Virginia H Noelke, chairperson, Citizens' Stamp Advisory Committee, c/o U S Postal Service, Stamp Services, 1735 North Lynn Street, Suite 5013, Arlington, VA 22209-6380. Letters must be submitted by June 30, 2004.

This is a unique hobby, and along with my pursuit in philately, coins and bank notes, I have been casually collecting autographs, autographed photographs and signed letters for the past 20 years and have over 200 personalities.

Can you please give more information to like minded collectors about the Autographs Club and how does one go about arranging the display for exhibitions??? How are the good autograph collectors going about their display???

ASHOK KUMAR TIWARY, Jamshedpur I want to point out something on the reaction of Dr. Satyendra Agarwal on JHARPHEX 2004.

Everybody is aware that now-a-days philatelic exhibitions are held in small towns & remote areas. Being a senior philatelist I go those places in JHARKHAND to help the Dept. of Post for organising that exhibition. I face very peculiar situation that time. Many collectors come there with their album or stock book full of stamps. They bring those stock books for participation. That time I tell them "How to display". Next day that person brings his stamp well mounted in 16 or 32 Pages. Now as a jury, I give him silver or bronze medal. Next time he participates in higher level exhibition & arranges his philatelic materials properly. Again he gets bronze or silver medal. Ultimate output is that he has got "The real test of PHILATELY" & a philatelist is born in a remote area who will guide many other people of that location. Isn't it promotion of philately?

Take the similar case of JHARPHEX as pointed by Dr. Agarwal. That girl had already applied for one frame of exhibit. She came with her stock book on the evening of 5th May. That time I told her how to display her collection. Next evening she came again with her 'READY EXHIBIT'. I allowed her to display & one frame was allotted (I was person-in charge of frame allotment). Had I done something wrong? Ultimately she was awarded DIPLOMA. Now she will take more interest in philately.

Being a senior philatelist, one must think of promoting this hobby at the grass-root level rather than thinking of Medals for himself. However, Dept of Post or Philatelic associations should organise philatelic workshops in such remote areas and small towns, then only people will be aware of exhibiting their collection.

HARRY POTTER ON STAMPS OF TAIWAN

Harry Potter, a magical concoction of the English writer J K Rowling, created an immediate sensation when the first book in the series was published in 2000. Dearly loved by young folk around the world, Harry Potter has become an immensely popular figure of children's folklore and

literature. The first and second film adaptations of this best selling series of novels have raked in US\$1.9 billion in box office. Through these novels and movies, Harry Potter has been successfully marketed worldwide. To encourage younger generations to collect stamps, Chunghwa Post is issuing two souvenir sheets entitled "Magical Creatures" and "Hogwarts." They are being timed to come out simultaneously with the release of the third Harry Potter movie "Harry Potter and the Prisoner of Azkaban" on June 4, 2004. Each of these sheets consists of six stamps, five with denominations of NT\$5 and one with a denomination of NT\$25. The stamps have been designed by Double Impact Licensing and Marketing Inc. and printed by China Color Printing Co., Ltd. in deepetch offset on Phosphorescent stamp paper in the quantity of 1 million each.

The designs of the "Magical Creatures" sheet are:
1. Owl Post (Upper Left): Harry's messenger owl, Hedwig, brings Harry a parcel containing a card and a present from Hermione on his 13th birthday

- 2. Close-up of Hedwig (Upper Right): By delivering messages and thus facilitating communication, Harry's pet Hedwig plays an important role.
- 3. Riding a Hippogriff for the First Time (Middle Left): As the new Care-of-Magical-Creatures teacher at Hogwarts, Hagrid gives Harry quidance as to how to ride a Hippogriff.
- 4. Close-up of a Hippogriff (Middle Right): Hippogriffs have the bodies, hind legs, and tails of horses, but the front legs, wings and heads of what seem to be giant eagles, with cruel, steel-colored beaks and large, brilliant orange eyes.
- 5. The Monster Book of Monsters (Lower Left): A present from Hagrid on Harry's 13th birthday. A required book for the Care-of-Magical-Creatures class, this book can bite and flip onto its edge and scuttle sideways on its covers like some weird crab.
- 6. Close-up of Crookshanks (Lower Right): Crookshanks is a huge, slightly bow-legged ginger cat with thick, fluffy fur.

The designs of the "Hogwarts" sheet are:
1. Quidditch Match (Upper Left): In the storm, Harry rides his Nimbus 2000 in Gryffindor's match against Hufflepuff.

- 2. Dementors Come onto the Quidditch Pitch (Upper Right): At the moment the Dementors set foot on the field, Harry feels a chill and hears the sound of his mother's pleading cries before she died. Then he crashes to the ground.
- 3. Riding a Hippogriff Together to Save Sirius Black (Middle Left): Harry and Hermione use a Time-Turner to rescue the Hippogriff Buckbeak. They then ride Buckbeak to rescue Sirius Black.
- 4. Third Year at Hogwarts (Middle Right): During his third year at Hogwarts, Harry learns how to defend himself from truly terrifying enemies.
- 5. Practicing the Patronus Charm to Repel Dementors (Lower Left): Professor Lupin, the Defense-Against-the-Dark-Arts teacher, uses a Boggart to teach Harry how to repel Dementors.

6. Conquering Fears (Lower Right): Harry bravely faces his fears to conjure a Patronus and defeat a Boggart that has turned into a Dementor.
