FORTHCOMING STAMP ISSUES

January 9: Dogs, set of 4 stamps and Miniature Sheet

These issues along with the First Day Cover and the information sheet, at Rs 2 each, shall be available on sale at nearly 1000 selected Post Offices including all Philatelic Bureaus and Counters in the country.

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SETHUPATHY STAMP RELEASED

India Post released a commemorative postage stamp in the denomination of Rs 5 on Bhaskara Sethupathy - the King of Ramanathapuram, on December 27, 2004.

Bhaskara Sethupathy, 1868 - 1903, took over as the Head of the Ramanathapuram state on April 3, 1889. He was a social reformer and patron of fine arts. He funded lots of religious, educational, and public welfare schemes. He was instrumental in Swami Vivekananda attending the World Religion Conference at Chicago in 1893.

'Sethupati', literally the 'Master of the Bridge' is a title carried by the rulers of the Ramanathapuram. It refers to the Kings as the protectors and caretakers of the bridge between India and Sri Lanka built in ancient times by Lord Rama.

India Security Press designed the stamp. Alka Sharma designed the First Day Cover and the pictorial first day postmark. Brochure containing write-up and technical data was issued on the occasion. The First Day Cover and the Brochure are priced at Rs 2 each. India Security Press printed the stamps by Photo Gravure in the quantity of 0.6 million.

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SPEED POST NATIONAL ACCOUNTS

India Post introduced a scheme of National Accounts last year on an experimental basis. High volume corporate customers with a minimum business of Rs 20 million a year were offered special rates for Speed Post articles. State Bank of India was identified as one such account. This proved very successful and the Bank's Speed Post business volume was Rs 140 million.

Encouraged by this the scheme was extended on an all India basis during November 2004. Under this scheme, India Post offered a flat rate of Rs 29 per Speed Post article up to 50 grams weight anywhere in India irrespective of distance subject to a minimum business of Rs 20 million a year.

#### ORISSA PIGEON POST

Orissa State Government maintains a pigeon post service with its main centre located at Cuttack, 40 kilometers from the State Capital, Bhubaneswar.

These birds fly hundreds of kilometers to deliver messages before returning to base and were an important means of communication during floods and cyclones in the state. However, with the service reduced today to a ceremonial presentation with the introduction of radio network and other communication means, the government is planning to retrench these pigeons.

The 400 pigeons will be handed over to the wildlife department to save about Rs 5.4 million per year. The pigeons are descendants of the Belgian Homer pigeons that were bought in 1946.

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#### MONETARY MUSEUM AT MUMBAI

Reserve Bank of India's (RBI) monetary museum will open to the public from January 1, 2005.

The museum traces the evolution of money in India and has a representative collection of monetary curiosities, financial instruments, Indian coinage and paper currency.

The coins from various eras – ancient, medieval and the princely states and regional powers, Indo-European companies, British India coinage, and the regular and commemorative coins of the Republic of India – trace the tale of the rise and fall of empires, the evolution in art forms, the advances in minting technology, the transition from precious metals to tokens and so on.

There's an interesting colonial story on half note, a type of currency. In order to deter postal theft and ensure that the note is cashed by the recipient only, the note was cut in half and each half was sent separately. The recipient pasted the two halves together and tendered the note for payment at the treasury office or bank.

Issue of Indian paper money, in its modern sense, dates back to the late 18th century. The museum has on display 19th century notes issued by the private sector banks and the three presidency banks – the Bank of Bengal Bank, Bank of Bombay and Bank of Madras, which were later merged to form Imperial Bank of India, now known as State Bank of India.

Further, on view are notes issued by the Government of India under the monopoly power granted by the Paper Currency Act of 1861, followed by notes issued by the Reserve Bank, the sole issuer of bank notes under the RBI Act, 1934.

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#### INDIAN POSTAL GUIDE 1869

Stamps of India have launched its publication program with reprinting 'Indian Postal Guide Containing the Chief Public Regulations of the Post Office with Other Information April 1, 1869'.

This is first in the series of elusive but significant official publications that are primary resources for history of postal communications in India. This is the first issue of the official postal guide of India. A very brittle and moth eaten copy is rediscovered and rescued that is perhaps the only surviving example in the world.

Its content include: Chief Officers of the Department, Exclusive Privilege of Indian Post Office, Inland Post, Postage stamps, List of Indian Post Offices, District Post, Foreign Post, Official Correspondence, Registration, Time Tables of Mail steamers, Government Bullock Train, Passenger Service, Money Orders, and Telegraph Department.

The 236 page hardbound reprint is a facsimile enlarged from original octavo to A4 size. This limited edition is available at a special price for €50 post paid anywhere in the world or Rs 2750 post paid in India.

PARCELS BY AIR

The Air mail parcel service from India to England was introduced with the flight from Karachi on June 11, 1931. Earlier the Air mail parcel service from England to India commenced from May 23, 1931.

Air mail parcels were accepted at any Post office in India for any post office in Great Britain and North Ireland.

The combined Air fee and postage was Rs 5 for a weight up to 1 pound, and Rs 4 for every additional pound or part.

Insurance was not available.

An airmail label and superscription 'Karachi - Croydon' was mandatory.

ALPHABET STAMPS

Hong Kong Post is issuing a set of 26 stamps on January 4, 2005 reinventing the Alphabet. Twenty-six ordinary objects are turned into the letters of the alphabet through an ingenious combination of imagery and typography, making the Alphabet Stamps a celebration of the A-Z of our daily lives. The stamps are:

A Clothes Peg
B Scissors
C Desk Lamp
D White Glue Bottle
E Steaming Rack
F Caliper
G C-clamp
H Bamboo Ladder
I Torch
J Cleaning Brush
K Stapler
L Sock
M Set Square
N Nail Clippers
O Rubber Band
P Scoop Colander
Q Padlock
R Sunglasses
S Coat Hanger
T Floor Brush
U Flip-flops
V Compasses
W Wine Opener
X Faucet Handle
Y Barbecue Fork
Z Paint Roller

These 26 items represent aspects of the daily lives of people in an endearingly familiar and functional fashion. It is hoped that this familiarity will spread the message that stamps are not just to be kept in an album for occasional viewing, but that stamps add color and joy to our daily lives.

Besides postage, the Alphabet Stamps can be used to personalize mail with a special message. For example, you could spell out "Happy Birthday" or "Thank You" on your envelope. Other uses abound, including commercial application by corporations looking for an eye-catching medium to convey promotional messages and recycling used stamps for use by children as 'language tools' for word games.

The stamps, all of which have a face value of \$1.40, are available in two formats - self-adhesive or gummed. The First Day Cover features three imaginative trial prototypes for the letters A, B and C, set against a background of lined paper of the type commonly used in schools.

The stamps are designed by Benny LAU and printed by Lithography by Cartor Security Printing, France.
