WATERFALLS MINIATURE SHEET REVISITED

India Post issued a miniature sheet on Waterfalls on October 3, 2003.

This miniature sheet was printed by Calcutta Security Printers in the quantity of 50,000 only as mentioned in the brochure that accompanies the issue.

Pradeep Kumar Agrawal from Patna reports that he has seen press-made packets of 100 miniature sheets with packet numbers ranging from 200 plus to above 800. How is this possible? Was this miniature sheet printed 100,000? Or some packets were made by the press of 50 miniature sheets?

By the way it is only private sector Security Printers that number packets of stamps and miniature sheets and not the India Security Press.

ACTIVE AUCTIONS

DAVID HEPPELL'S REVENUES

Most of the stamp and Indian revenue collections/accumulations of the late David Heppell are at this moment traveling from Canada to London, where they will be auctioned by a well known London auction house later this year or early next year. David was a founder of "The Princely States Report" and also involved in the just published "India Revenue Catalog" with M Blatt, and A M Mollah.

PRINCELY STATES AT HARMERS

On June 14, 2005 Harmers of London held a sale where the first 276 lots were of Indian Native States, of these 12 lots were withdrawn, 106 lots were not sold, and 158 lots were sold, some at multiples of the estimate.

WORLD BANK SEMINAR ON INDIA POST

World Bank organized a Seminar on 'Transformation of India Post for Vision 2020' at New Delhi on June 15 & 16, 2005.

The Communications and IT Minister, Dayanidhi Maran, in his message to the Seminar said "The department should expand its Finance Mart network to spin-off the Post Bank".

India Post has launched a number of financial services and these have been contributing 45 per cent of its revenues. India Post is planning to reorganize services such as bill payment, life and general insurance, mutual funds and government securities under one roof through its Finance Marts and will set up 160 Finance Marts during the year.

India Post currently has a budgetary deficit over Rs 14 billion. Maran said that India Post must move in the next few years to ensure that the deficit in its revenues and expenditure is wiped out in the non-Universal Service Obligation (USO) segments.

Meanwhile the Government of India has appointed global consultant KPMG to prepare a report on restructuring the postal network in the country. The mandate given to KPMG includes identifying new areas of business. KPMG will also review the pricing of postal products and services and the sustainability of loss-making and unpopular products. KPMG has been

told to assess the postal services in terms of their utility, viability, pricing and to suggest ways to re-engineer the existing products.

India Post is also looking at the feasibility of sustaining the Government's USO in a competitive market. Currently, the postal network has 40 products and services, many of which, like the mail services, have become obsolete with the availability of faster and more costeffective modes of communication.

Dear Mr. Jose, your letter was quite interesting. You are 25 years of age, and you have collected stamps for several years. You are doing it the right way, exchanging with friends in your locality and now contacting foreign collectors thru the internet.

BUT your comment about the editor of this newsletter to "Make freely available at low cost, philatelic accessories like stamp albums, tweeters (I think you may have meant tweezers), lenses etc. through your website". Mr. Jose the editor is simply the editor, not a stamp dealer. He does have an advertisement link to dealers, many of which can supply your requirements at a reasonable cost. The editor of the newsletter

has a family to support as do most of the dealers, please do not expect everything free or at a very low cost, you will be disappointed in life.

You advise that Indian stamps are not beautiful, you should be aware that beauty is in the eye of the beholder. If you think something is ugly, then it will be ugly. If you think something is beautiful, then it will be beautiful. Many, many Indian stamps are truly beautiful, I am sure that you will agree with this statement.

The editor is attempting to include more photos, but there is a limit, as everything costs in money and time. Your few paragraphs you say "I took pains to write this feedback". The editor writes 10 to 20 times what you wrote, each and every week, he truly scans the world to bring YOU the information you need on Indian stamps. You may not be aware but India Post is a very difficult, often impossible organization to get information from, but the editor does it.

I am not sure if you recall the magazine "Ind Dak" run by the late Col. Shenoi. It was an excellent magazine of the highest caliber, since the death of the Col. it has ceased to exist. Most other Indian philatelic magazines are only issued randomly, some really very randomly. "Stamps of India" has been issued, more or less, every week since it's inception no small task in India.

You suggest "Target the younger generation" - this newsletter is targeted at everyone. When there is a special exhibition targeted toward school children, it is included.

May I ask what do you think you, or anyone can do to get the younger generation interested in stamps, where they can learn to read and understand about history, geography. I am sure that this newsletter is available to every class room in India at no cost. Thank you for reading this, and I thank you for writing Mr. Jose.

EMBROIDERED STAMP FROM AUSTRIA

Embroidery is the stuff of which the most valuable fashion dreams are made. Wars have been fought over embroidery, women kidnapped and men seduced. Embroidery is the only textile technique whose products are the result of an artistic destruction process. Scissors, needles and thread followed the embroideries from China along the Silk Road to Babylon. Monks then brought the secrets of embroidery to the monasteries and the imperial courts of Europe, where its practitioners soon acquired special rights. Empress Maria Theresia also granted these rights to the embroiderers of the Bregenz Woods, whose hand-made embroidery created the basis for this centre of Vorarlberg embroidery in the 18th century. For decades, it has been a key element of the Austrian export trade.

Vorarlberg embroiders for the world. Its customers can be found in 180 countries on all five continents. Comparable to the mesh used in guipure, the queen of embroideries, the Vorarlberg embroiderers have

developed a network of markets that inseparably combine innovation and quality. Thousands of patterns in the embroidery companies' archives testify to their diligence, skill and ever-new ideas. Fashion has always told stories that can be worn.

They can now stuck on postcards, envelopes, in an album, on the skin or in a wallet. The smallest work of embroidery art now decorates a stamp. The dress has been designed by Haemmerle & Vogel from Lustenau, a long-standing family business and embroiderers to the avant-garde. It is here that the most outrageous desires of the fashion kings are turned into reality. And it is here that a stamp has been created that can be worn. The leitmotif of this unusual creation is the edelweiss, queen of alpine flowers. So real you could pick it, the petals and the pollen are in relief against the thick base of threads. The serrated edge of the stamp is as indestructible as the myth of the edelweiss. Embroidery is an art, plastic, valuable and timeless. And art comes from the artisan, the skilled worker. The art is what one has the skill to do.

The dress on the stamp is a festive Austrian dress. It will bear the date of first issue, but never go out of fashion. It will travel around the world and tell a new and unusual story, the story of the stamp that wears an embroidered dress. In 2005 it is a commemorative stamp from Austria, born in Lustenau, the metropolis of the Vorarlberg embroidery industry.

The stamp will be issued on July 19, 2005 in the denomination of Euro 3.75. View the image at
