Harry Potter and the Half-Blood Prince, the 6<sup>th</sup> and penultimate book in the Harry Potter series, was released on July 16, 2005 in the UK, the US, Canada, Australia, New Zealand, South Africa and India.

There was an advance order of 125,000 copies for book 6 in India, twice that of the book five. The Potter mania was evident by fans forming long ques in front of bookshops at very early hours. The copies disappeared at lighting sped and over 100,000 copies were sold on the day one across India.

The book 6 is expected to outsell book 5 that sold 8.5 million copies worldwide. All this was possible due to the marketing blitz.

We dream of such marketing efforts for stamps in India to tap the potential that is very much there.

FREE HOME DELIVERY OF STAMPS One of the new schemes introduced by Dayanidhi Maran, Minister for Communications and Information Technology, on July 18, 2005 at Chennai is the sale of special stamp packets, costing Rs 100 and Rs 200, containing postal stamps in the denomination of Rs 5 by the postmen.

The Postmen will also collect mails from home and offices for dispatch.

Maran said while inaugurating the scheme that 'We are changing with times. And it is only a beginning while a lot is yet to come in the next four years. Pointing out that the need for postal service was getting reduced in the wake of increase in the use of e-mails and 'lower telephone tariff,' the Minister said, 'We have planned to expand the activities of postal department, which is the largest department in the country with about 0.55 million employees'. He added, 'The new scheme is part of the department's decision to utilize the available workforce more effectively. Earlier, postmen will return empty handed after delivery of posts. But from now onwards, it is not so.'

THE HIGHEST POST OFFICE IN THE WORLD Vikas Singh

If you thought that highest post office in the world is at Jungfraujoch (11333 feet) think again. It is not even Mount Fuji (12290 feet). The world's highest post office is in India.

This branch post office is located in small town of Hikkim, in Lahaul Spiti district of Himachal Pradesh. It is located at height of 15500 feet. The pin code for this post office is 172114.

We sent a structured questionnaire by registered letter along with prepaid envelope from Ghaziabad to the branch postmaster at Hikkim on  $11^{th}$  June. The letter was received on  $16^{th}$  June. Mr. Rinchon Chhering, the branch postmaster mailed back the questionnaire in prepaid envelope on  $17^{th}$  June. The envelope reached us on  $25^{th}$  June.

Hikkim has population of 600. There is a motorable road till Hikkim. The nearest main post office is at Kaza, located 25 kms away. The nearest hospital is at Kaza. Around 50 people have a savings account in the Hikkim post office. The post office handles around 15-20 letters everyday. Mr Chhering has been at the post office since November 1983.

ALSO IN THE NEWS

MORE CUSTOMIZED STAMPS FOR US FROM US Pitney Bowes announced on July 18, 2005 that it will launch a customized postage service through an alliance with Zazzle. Meanwhile, Stamps.com announced a deal with Zazzle's main rival, CafePress.com, to sell customized postage stamps.

Zazzle's new service lets customers create full-color customized stamps using images they upload at <u>www.zazzle.com</u> or images already available on there, including famous characters from Disney. Pitney Bowes provides the software to manage the transaction between the customer and the United States Postal Service. Visitors to Zazzle's site can design sheets of 20 stamps in the most common denominations from 23 cents (postcards) and 37 cents (First-Class letters) to \$3.85, similar to other similar services. Zazzle reviews all uploaded images for adherence to USPS guidelines. Once approved, the stamps are printed and shipped to the customer within 24 hours.

Early next month, Stamps.com's customized postage stamp product PhotoStamps will become a customization option for CafePress.com's shopkeepers and members. Each shopkeeper will be able to provide unique PhotoStamps designs to customers via their individual shops. Shopkeepers will be able to customize the images on the PhotoStamps to reflect the overall theme of their individual shop. Customers then may order PhotoStamps from Stamps.com through the regular CafePress order process.

CafePress has built a community of 2 million people worldwide who have expressed their creativity on more than 70 items ranging from T-shirts to bumper stickers to mugs to postcards. Nearly 10 million unique products are available through the CafePress Marketplace.
