## GURU GRANTH SAHIB STAMP UPDATE

India Post planned to issue a commemorative stamp to mark the 400 years of Guru Granth Saheb, the Holy Book of the Sikhs that is revered as the Guru Saheb. Although no circular was issued by India Post for the date of issue, the stamp, miniature sheet, and First Day cover was accompanied by the brochure stating the date of issue as June 16, 2005. The stamps, FDC, and the brochure are routinely delivered to several hundred post offices all over India in advance for sale to the public on the date of issue.

The Guru Granth Saheb stamp release had to be postponed due to the non agreement between the Punjab Government and the Shiromani Gurdwara Parbandhak Committee, the apex body of the Sikhs, regarding who and where the stamp will be released. Eventually the date of issue was postponed and a communication was issued to this effect. Unfortunately several post offices that did not receive information in time about the issue being deferred sold the stamp on June 16, 2005. We carried the report to this effect in Issue # 226 of June 23, 2005.

On August 1, 2005 Bibi Jagir Kaur, SGPC chief, seeking an immediate ban on its release said that the design of 'parkash' of Guru Granth Sahib in a palanquin was not as per tradition of Sikhism. She said the SGPC had supplied the design to the Central Government, but instead of using that design, the government preferred to use the 'faulty design' which could not be tolerated by the Sikh panth.

In the month of May 2005, Sukjinder Kaur, Director Postal Services, Punjab circle, had personally gone to meet the Bibi to discus about the stamp, its design and its release and this was covered in all the regional papers of Punjab from Amritsar.

On August 2, 2005 The Commission for Minorities (NCM) has asked the Ministry of Communications and Information Technology to take immediate action regarding the stamp design. The NCM called the release of stamp in the current form as "an act of sacrilege that will definitely hurt religious sentiments of the entire Sikh community". NCM Chairperson Tarlochan Singh participated in a meeting held between NCM members and senior postal officials on the issue on August 1, 2005.

Singh said "I spoke to Akal Takht Jathedar Joginder Singh Vedanti on phone yesterday and described the stamp to him. He said that Guru Granth Sahib is revered as a living God of Sikhs, therefore no photograph can be printed in any form and that too in a stamp accessible to public. And that too without a 'rumala', as in accordance with the Sikh maryada. In fact, the Head Priest of Bangla Sahib Gurdwara, Giani Ranjeet Singh, who was also present at the meeting yesterday, also rejected the stamp in its present form."

"Earlier too, postal stamps on Sikh religion have been released but they were done in an appropriate manner. For example, for the 500-year- birth anniversary of Guru Nanak Dev, a picture of his birthplace Nankana Sahib was printed on the stamp. Likewise for the 300-year-birth anniversary celebrations of Guru Gobind Singh, a picture of his birthplace Patna Sahib was used on the stamp," he said.

IT IS RAKHI SEASON AGAIN

Rakhi or Raksha Bandhan is a festival celebrating the bond of affection between brothers and sisters. This day the siblings pray for each others' well being and wish for each others' happiness and goodwill. 'Raksha Bandhan' literally means 'a bond of protection'. Raksha Bandhan is a pledge from brothers to protect the sister from all harms and troubles and a prayer from the sister to protect the brother from all evil. Sisters tie Rakhi, made of colorful threads, on the wrist of brothers. The festival is celebrated on the full moon day of the Sravana month that usually falls in August every year.

Following last year's successful launch India Post have once again released special envelopes for the safe transit in mail for the Rakhis this year.

Last year these un-stamped envelopes priced between Rs 2 and Rs 3 were issued in the postal circles where the festival is celebrated.

CHINNAMALAI STAMP RELEASED

The Minister for Communication and Information Technology, Dayanidhi Maran released a commemorative stamp in the denomination of Rs 5 on July 31, 2005 at Chennai on first freedom fighter from Kongu region of Tamilnadu, Konguvel Dheeran Chinnamalai.

Chinnamalai was born on April 17, 1765 at Melapalayam in Erode district, Tamilnadu. He was named Theerthagiri but assumed the name Chinnamalai when he prevented the outflow of tax from his area to the ruler of Mysore, Hyder Ali. Tipu Sultan who succeeded Ali supported Chinnamalai in fighting against British. Chinnamalai and his men fought many battles including Chitheswaram, Mazhavalli, and Srirangapatnam. He settled in Odanilai after Sultan's death and continued fighting the British. His cook informed the enemy and he was captured and hanged on July 31, 1805.

India Security Press designed the stamp. Alka Sharma designed the First Day Cover and the pictorial first day postmark. Brochure containing write-up and technical data was issued on the occasion. The First Day Cover and the Brochure are priced at Rs 2 each. India Security Press printed the stamps by Photo Gravure in the quantity of 0.6 million.

stamp issue program for 2005 and 2006 but the India Post has not yet made it public. The Minister Dayanidhi Maran during the stamp release function on July 31, 2005 at Chennai announced that India Post will release commemorative stamps on Mr Subbu Ram, popular Carnatic singer M S Subbulakhshmi, Popular film actor Gemini Ganesan, Tamil Scholor Kavimani Desiya Vinayagam Pillai during this year. He also accepted a proposal in the same function to issue a stamp on Kalaingarayan the leading farmer of the Kongu region who linked the Noyyal and Cauveri Rivers and build the Kalingarayan cannal to benefit the farmers in that area. ## NATIONAL POSTAL POLICY

The Minister of State for Communications & Information Technology Dr Shakeel Ahmad, has informed the Lok Sabha that the Government is proposing to formulate National Postal Policy and is currently engaged in the process of updating the provisions of the Indian Post Office Act to make it more relevant to the times and empower the Postal Services Board so that the department enjoys more functional autonomy. The Government has also recognised the need to clearly identify the Universal Service Obligation and the cost of fulfilling it, which, today, is included as a part of the Department's budgetary deficit/loss. A major exercise has been initiated to review the system in terms of structure, products, processes, resources, accounting and pricing structure, technology requirements, etc., and to identify how best the Department can meet the twin challenges of becoming commercially viable while continuing to fulfill the Universal Service Obligation.

Dr Ahmed further said that the exercise to formulate the National Postal Policy is underway taking into account these initiatives and their outcomes. Since the exercise involves inter-departmental consultations and completion of the above initiatives, no specific time frame can be indicated at this juncture.

As regards the postal network in the remote/rural areas, the department is not lagging behind any private courier company, he said. India has the largest postal network in the world and 89% of it is in the rural area. Basic postal services in terms of daily delivery of dak, collection of letters and sales of stamps and stationery are being provided throughout the country through this network irrespective of terrain.

The market share of Speed Post is around 11% as per a projection made by Kurt Salmon & Associates in their report 'Market Survey on Express Market -- December, 2001'. However, market share of India Post is about 50% in the mail delivery market if all mail products are put together.

With a view to increase the share in the Express Market and further expansion of postal services in rural areas, Dr Ahmad said that the Government has made a number of value additions, like free pick up facility, door to door delivery, internet-based track and trace, volume based discounts and credit facility have been provided over the years. The number of booking counters and offices with facility for booking upto late hours has been increased. Basic postal services in terms of daily delivery, collection of letters and sale of stamps and stationery are already available throughout the country. Post Offices will continue to be opened subject to fulfillment of distance, population and income norms.

The above information was given by Dr Shakeel Ahmad, on August 3, 2005 in the Lok Sabha in a written reply to the question by Kailash Meghwal. DR AVINASH B JAGTAP (Binningen / Switzerland)

I read about the new scheme to be introduced by Mr. Dayanidhi Maran, Minister for Communication and Information Technology, whereby packets of special stamps, valued at Rs. 100 and 200 will be sold by the postman to the needy customers and the postman will also collect the covers and frank them and deliver them to the local post office for the further journey to their destinations (Stamps of India, No. 230, of July 24, 2005).

I read also a letter by Ms. Meena Singh of Noida, who rightly points out that the moral fabric of our society has fallen so low that we will not trust the postman, that he will affix stamps to our letters and carry them to the local post office for further transport. Even Mr. Maran, should have known the hesitation on the part of the customers of India Post to mr. Maran's new scheme. Is it not too much a trust that we put in the personnel of India Post? On the contrary, the post offices (at least in Pune) in Maharashtra warn their customers that when they submit their covers at the counter, they should insist that the stamps affixed to the covers are obliterated IN THEIR PRESENCE! This clearly shows that even the Post Offices in Maharashtra can not trust in their employees, for the fear that the affixed stamps could be detached and sold futher to other customers!

I strongly oppose the introduction of the new scheme by Mr. Maran. This will open a new prairie to the post employees to better their revenue in the name of service to the masses and even when India Post is admant in putting their scheme into practice, it is ultimately the people, who should not buy any packets or accept the services of India Post that their mail will be franked and carried furter to the local post office for its further transport. We should better rely on ourself and offer impediment to corrupt practices. It is surprising that India Post could show so much trust in its employees at the cost of the public and invite corruption instead of eradicating it.
