BANGKOK 2007 ASIAN INTERNATIONAL

The 20th Asian International Philatelic Exhibition will be held from August 3 to 12, 2007 at Bangkok, Thailand. BANGKOK 2007 is being held under the patronage of the Federation of Inter Asian Philately and expected to have 800 to 1000 frames in the competitive classes from 23 countries/territories.

The Jury from India is Dilip Shah, and the National Commissioner for India is Anil Suri. The exhibitors participating from India include: Kishor Chandak - Indian Instructional Labels & Markings, Nawal Kishore Tatiwala - Gemology, Rajan Jayakar - Fiscals of British India 1800-1900, Anil Suri - Fiscals of Cochin, Angeet Suri - British Army Uniforms, S C Sukhani - The Third Printing India 4 Annas of 1854, and Ajit Sukhatankar - Early India Cancellations.

INDIA POST TIES UP WITH VISHWANATH TEMPLE The devotees of ancient Vishwanath temple at Varanasi can now get the vibhuti (holy ash) by sending a money order of Rs 60 to the Senior Superintendent of Post offices, Varanasi Head Post Office 221001. India Post signed an agreement with Kashi Vishwanath Temple Trust to ensure the delivery of vibhuti.

AUDITOR GENERAL'S REPORT ON INDIA POST The Comptroller and Auditor General of India as the supreme audit institution of India conducts regulatory as well as performance audits and assists the state and central institutions on their accounts and accountability. The Performance audit Report # 1 of 2007 tabled in Parliament recently is divided in three chapters where the first chapter entirely focuses on the mail management.

Mail management involves mail collection, sorting, transmission and delivery of letters and other articles and is aimed at ensuring early delivery of mail, efficient utilisation of the resources and improved customer services. In view of the large volume of incoming and outgoing mail, efficient management of mail is one of the most important tasks of the Department of Posts (DoP). India has the largest postal network in the world with 155,516 post offices, out of which 125,148 post offices are situated in rural areas.

Performance audit of Mail Management in DoP was conducted during April to August 2006, covering the period 2001-2002 to 2005-06. Twenty one out of 22 postal circles were reviewed in audit. In each of the circles, two Head Post Offices (HPOs) and seven sub offices (SOs), including two rural SOs, under each HPO were selected randomly for the purpose of audit.

Some of the major deficiencies observed by Audit in respect of mail management were as follows: Mail traffic registered a decline of nearly 50 per cent during last five years due to increased competition from private couriers and other modes of communication especially the value added services in telecom sector. Despite this, DoP failed to improve its operational efficiency, reduce staff costs and modernize its operations to render better services to the customer.

DoP continued to incur losses during last five years and 16 out of the 20 postal services continued to sustain losses over the years. The net

loss for the year ending 31 March 2006 was Rs 120.771 billion (US\$ 300 million approximately).

According to National Test Letter Run conducted by the department, only 55 per cent of mail was delivered within the prescribed norms for delivery.

The projects for computerization of Head Records Offices, Computerized Registration Centers and Transit Mail Offices have fallen behind schedule and the computers installed were not being used for faster processing of mail and other articles in handling offices. Hardware worth Rs 67.2 million remained idle due to inadequate infrastructure, non-preparation of site, etc.

Department's efforts to modernize and mechanize mail sorting operations at Chennai and Mumbai to improve operational efficiency through introduction of Automatic Mail Processing machines and Culler-Facer-Cancellor machines also did not succeed despite investment of Rs 602.5 million due to its failure to standardize mail and ensure adequate public awareness about the advantages of using standard postal stationery. As a result, the Automatic Mail Processing machines are being underutilized to the extent of 66.39 per cent to 71.78 per cent and Culler-Facer-Cancellor machines to the extent of 93.20 per cent to 98.54 per cent. Similar projects for introducing Automatic Mail Processing Centers at a total cost of Rs 842.7 million at Delhi and Kolkata have been delayed due to deficient project management.

Book Now Pay Later facility was allowed to customers without taking advance deposits from them which resulted in accumulation of outstanding dues of Rs 13.6 million in 12 Head Post Offices test checked.

Business Post facility was extended to customers without taking advance which resulted in accumulation of outstanding dues of Rs 20.2 millions in eight Head Post Offices test checked.

Terminal dues amounting to Rs 28.4 million were pending against 23 countries from 1999 to 2004.

Agreement was signed with United Arab Emirates without taking into account weight and distance element which resulted in loss of Rs 91.5 million during the period February 2002 to December 2002.

The department also did not effectively monitor settlement of complaints to improve customer satisfaction.

SHIVA FAMILY ON CZECH STAMP

Czech Republic issued a stamp on February 21, 2007 featuring Art of India from the Collections of the National Gallery at Zbraslav Castle of the Náprstek (National) Museum of Asian, African and American Cultures. The collection of the National Gallery is exhibited in six locations in the Czech capital, Prague and the Zbraslav Castle houses the non-European art collection of the National Gallery.

The stamp in the denomination of 24 Koruny depicts a 19th Century Glass Painting of Indian Gods - Shiva, Parvati and Ganes. Martin Srb engraved

the design printed in sheets of 4 by recess process from flat plate in black combined with offset.

Under-painting on glass became popular in India in the 19th century. These paintings feature either religious or courtly themes. They show both various Hindu gods and portraits of rulers, courtiers or courtesans. The painting technique differs from painting on paper or wood in that it begins with details which are next covered with larger areas of tempera. The painting includes glossy details made of a metal sheet fixed to the back side of the painting in order to show through and imitate e.g. jewels. Most paintings are of a small size, the theme covers the whole painting. The painting texture is finished with dots and lines of rich and lively colors. The technique of painting on glass requires a good workmanship. In India the paintings used to be hung on walls especially by middle-class families.
