Under the agreement, Mail Order Solution (MOS) will operate as a Swiss Post International sales agent in the country. MOS provides end-to-end integrated direct marketing solutions in print production and international postal services and distribution.

Swiss Post International offers a range of postal products and services to business customers. With its foothold in India, Swiss Post International now has expanded its international presence into 16 countries and Mumbai is now one of the five locations of the company in Asia. The other locations in Asia are Singapore, Hong Kong, Kuala Lumpur and Shanghai.

INDIA UAE EXPRESS MONEY ORDER SERVICE

Minister of Communications and Information and Technology A Raja inaugurated international money order service between the UAE and India on May 4, 2008 at Chennai.

The service launched by Emirates Post and India Post uses the secure international financial system (IFS) network operated by the Universal Postal Union (UPU). The service will initially offer remittances from the UAE to India and will cover 97 head post offices and more than 2,400 sub-post offices in Delhi, Mumbai, Chennai, Kolkata, Kerala and Mahe.

A single money order issued by Emirates Post for payment in India must not exceed \$2,500 (Dh 9,100) or its equivalent. And only 12 money orders addressed to one beneficiary will be allowed in a calendar year. Amounts up to Rs 20,000 (Dh 1,814) will be paid at the address in cash. Sums greater than Rs 20,000 and up to Rs 50,000 will be paid in cash only at a post office and amount more than Rs 50,000 will be payable only by cheque.

The oft repeated Vodafone advertisement that is aired during the IPL matches shows the pug licking the stamps and a little girl sticking at random, the high denominational definitives of Rs 20 and Rs 50 on envelopes. The philatelic knowledge of the advertisement copywriter seems to be very poor as is evident from the inappropriate postage stamps being used. Or is it to show the innocent ignorance of the sweet cherub?

I am sure many philatelists must have taken note of this anomaly. The advertisement seems to have been shot in a foreign locale; otherwise it would have been good to have it corrected.

NUMISMATIC AS A FASCINATING AND LUCRATIVE HOBBY By Santanu Panigrahi, Modipara, Sambalpur, Orissa

Philately and Numismatic are like twins with many similarities. Both are treated as royal hobbies. The nature and fundamentals of both the hobbies are incomparable. Presently Numismatic items are booming like never before. Collecting coins and Bank notes is no more treated as a hobby; rather it is being viewed as a mode of fruitful investment.

Recent perfect example is 26th Toddywala auction held on 13th April 2008 at Mumbai, where one Rs 5000 note was hammered in favor of an anonymous bidder for Rs 0.66 million highest sum ever paid for an Indian Bank note. This was almost double of its estimated price of Rs 0.3-035 million. Likewise Six Indo-Portuguese specimen notes were sold for Rs 0.31 million compared to an estimated price of Rs 160,000-180,000. This shows the pace of growth of the hobby, because demand is rising manifold, where as supply is constant. So it is quite natural that prices are bouncing high. As compared to last year prices of numismatic items have risen by 30% and if this trend will continue then the price will rise at a rapid pace.

The biggest demand at present is for pre-independence Indian notes. The most sought for rare note of "Rupees Two Annas Eight" bearing the sign of the Governor M M S Gubbay was issued on 2nd January, 1918 and withdrawn on 1st January, 1926. This is a unique note, because no such odd value note has ever been issued in Indian sub continent except this example.

The demand for rare note comes from numismatics enthusiasts to enrich their collection. But this trend has changed and many people have taken this as a good investment. So forgery is common as demand is more and supply is less. Recently I have got scan of forgery note of Rs.2.8 Annas which is clearly visible due to paper quality and its printing. The another scan where one Original design of 100 Rupees note showing the profile portrait of King George VI bearing the sign of the Governor C D Deshmukh. The design of the note has been tampered by computer, where in "RESERVE BANK OF INDIA" has been printed at the top as "EAST INDIA COMPANY" on both sides, the serial number in both panels have been changed and in the reverse side the tiger head has been tampered and replaced with the seal of eagle. The note is showing clear vision of tampering.

It is pertinent to mention here that no bank note has ever been issued by "EAST INDIA COMPANY" as the governance of India passed to the Crown after the hostilities of 1857-58. The first series of uniface designed note showing the portrait of Queen Victoria and "GOVERNMENT OF INDIA" in bold letter were printed at the top was issued in circulation guaranteed the payment by Government through the Indian Paper Money Act of 1861. The next change in design of Indian Paper Money was after the establishment of the Reserve Bank of India in 1935 as the central note-issuing authority. The first notes of the Reserve Bank of India were issued in 1938 showing the portrait of the new King George VI.

So the tampering of the design of the 100 Rupees note in both sides with the help of computer shows either lack of knowledge or to attract the collector's fancy with innovative idea and design. So, whatever may the case such endeavor is endangering the future of the hobby.

Similarly Rs 5 note issued on 15th September, 1947 bearing the sign of the Governor C D Deshmukh showing the facing portrait of King George VI has been tampered, where in the value in word at top left and right corners have made strait. In the reverse side the small sitting deer at the remote corner has been eliminated showing only three deers. I could not obtain the scan of this note. But the collectors are to remain alert and not to fall in trap for such type of fake / fancy notes.

Hobbies are for pleasure and to acquire knowledge out of it. But making farce of such ill motive adventure will spoil the fundamental factor of the hobby.
