THE WORLD CRISIS AND STAMP COLLECTING

Hello Friends - long since you heard from me, but today I have an important issue to discuss. Please note that what is written about politics and economy is not for a discussion of such issues we have decided not to deal with here, but it is the necessary background for the text about stamps during the present world crisis. You know, as a comparison, you can't discuss the behavior of a child without taking into consideration its home and its parents!

Economic crisis is the word spreading around the world like wildfire - only those who have power to do something about it seem to hide their heads in the sand like an ostrich.

And our Swedish minister of finance said yesterday: "Sheer and brutal greed and a careless risk taking, first of all in American banks, has got an influence on the whole world economy, and a stronger international mechanism of rules will be needed."

What has this to do with stamp collecting? We are not supposed to discuss political issues here. But this is much more than a political issue, it has to do with the very foundations of our economy. And here, stamp collecting comes in. The fact that the whole world - through the international market - is in the hands of people who have enormous power is something we can hardly do anything about as individuals. But we are stamp collectors - what does it mean in the present situation?

Shares in the stock market, paper money and such like are very uncertain values, even real estate is at risk. What about stamps? I feel sure that stamps, like precious metals, is a more secure object of investment. We usually think about stamps because we love them for what they are, value is not always a priority with many of us. But now, people who have no experience from stamps will ask us about stamps for investment, because they are scared and insecure.

I think old stamps in general will remain valuable and probably prices will be on the rise. US stamps more than 50 years old are interesting, newer US stamps are not, due to the high numbers issued. Some thematics will be attractive, sports and animals and a few others, they are always in demand. And the stamps of India and China are getting more and more attractive due to the positive trends in the markets of those countries.

These are not my own ideas, I have taken them from experts who have published their recommendations in newspapers and magazines. I would like to see what you think about the matter!

WHO SAYS THERE IS COMPETITION IN COMPETITION CLASS? By Naresh Agrawal, Bilaspur

I always hear from old veteran philatelists that in philatelic competitions one has to win and the other to lose. After recently concluded INPEX 2008 an unhealthy atmosphere of competitiveness amongst the philatelists has been created by making the jurors kingpin. 1st, 2nd, 3rd, yes, if only these three prizes are to be awarded in an exhibition/class of philately, I would agree that some competition would be there but in philatelic exhibitions there is mark awarding system. As in INPEX 2008 it was a grading system on the basis of marks obtained. So there can be 20 Gold Grade exhibits out of the 40 displayed or there can be only one. What I mean is that one must not forget that:

1. Every exhibit is different and not same: unlikely in competitions normally every competitor has to solve the same/similar problem or perform the same/similar thing. And also the things are not to be performed instantly. In fact, this is evaluation of the work done by a participant

2. Independent judgment/evaluation and is not comparative: It is judgment of the individual performance on independent basis and is not comparative; jurors do not compare the exhibit with the other; may be in the same class

3. it's a grading/evaluation system: It is not like a racing competition where 1st, 2nd, 3rd awarded. Here in philately Grades are given in the name of Gold, Silver, Bronze etc. that's all. No 1st, 2nd, 3rd.

4. No winner, No Loser: Competition means that one has to win and other has to lose. Here no one wins and no one looses because everyone gets some grade or the other. Yes, may be lower or higher depending upon the marks obtained during evaluation of the exhibit.

5. Evaluation of the exhibits only: Once again I repeat that exhibits are displayed (in whatever class) are for evaluation of the exhibit and for display for the public. There is no question of competitiveness.

6. No instant performance: As already stated above, there is no instant performance to be given by the participant. It's again evaluation of the work done, submitted beforehand and placed for public display.

Yes, there may be slight difference in opinion about evaluation of the exhibits unlike in other competitive examinations where no answer sheet is on general display e.g. painting competition. In fact exhibitions are not competitions. Exhibitions are exhibitions of philatelic collections within a set framework of display system.

7. Yes, if philatelists are asked to bring all their philatelic material they have in particular class and then like in painting

competition they are asked to prepare exhibit /part of exhibit on the spot, then I would say a competition will be there. But here in the present system of exhibiting there is no competition but only Grading and this should not be recognized as competition.

Discussion on this matter can be prolonged but to conclude what I feel and mean is that though Competition Class is there but still it is not competitive. It should be renamed as Grading Class to check all the disappointment emerging out of it. Even instead of Gold, Silver, Bronze, grade certificates should be given. This will help organizers a lot to check their budgetary problems to a big extent and also the jurors won't have any pressure upon them to fit the judgment with in the stipulated medal lot provided to them by the organizers.

In nutshell, I personally feel that we should not compare our exhibit with the other but see that whether our evaluation has been done properly. Further to add to this I would profess formation of a recognized and approved evaluating agency comprising of different people/philatelists which will check this so called unhealthy competitiveness.

I conclude this by quoting that there can be 90 Gold medals for 90 participants depending upon their valuation. READERS FORUM <Dear Reader, Your feedback is important to us as it helps evolve the newsletter. Please send us have your thoughts and suggestions.>

HEMANT V KULKARNI, Milwaukee, USA

I've been saving stamps from various envelopes, sleeves, wrapper envelopes received from India. Since I live in the US often these typically possess a relatively high face value with nice designs and décor on a larger size than the typical Rs. 5.00 denomination stamps. When I tried to unglue these by simple cold water immersion techniqe, often the colour of the envelope bleeds into the loose stamp making it unworthy of my granddaughter's hobby collection. Your reader base seems elite and well read on the subject of professional stamp collecting and related literature. I wonder if anyone can suggest a method by which the above problem can be circumvented? Just clipping that portion of the glued stamp from an envelope isn't good enough of an alternative for a child's mind.
