MAHATMA GANDHI SPECIMENS SCALE NEW HEIGHTS

A set of India Mahatma Gandhi commemorative stamps of 1948 overprinted Specimen and mounted in official presentation folder sold for a record Rs 1.11 million (US\$ 22,200) on October 17, 2008 on eBay.com. This was bought by an Indian philatelist and speaks volumes about the health of philatelic industry in India especially in these days of global financial crisis.

INDIA POST INVENTS!

Since long Government of India owned India Security Press Nasik charges exorbitant prices to India Post for printing postage stamps. While private security printers employed during 1992 - 2004 charged reasonable prices as is the case with these printers worldwide. Security Printing Press Hyderabad began printing stamps since 2006 and being Government of India owned follows India Security Press Nasik in regard of prices.

In September 2008 India Post took cognizance of the fact that India Security Press Nasik and Security Printing Press Hyderabad, both charge about Rs 12/13 for printing each miniature sheet and decided to price the miniature sheets accordingly.

This could have been achieved in many ways particularly in cases where Rs 5 denomination stamps were involved. One way was to print a block of 4 of Rs 5 stamp. Another way was to provide the same design, with or without changes, in higher denomination in the miniature sheet. The miniature sheet could contain altogether another design in higher denomination as was done in case of Mother Teresa miniature sheet of 1997.

However, India post found a new innovative way in issuing the miniature sheet on Philately Day on October 13, 2008. This miniature sheet contains a stamp in the denomination of Rs 5 and on the miniature sheet Rs 15/- is printed as the price. The same price, Rs 15 is also mentioned in the Brochure accompanying this issue.

This miniature sheet was printed by the Security Printing Press Hyderabad where label on the packet of miniature sheets didn't carry any details regarding price however the invoice accompanying the supply to philatelic bureaus mentions the price of miniature sheet at Rs 20. Thus the philatelic bureaus across country are selling the same not for Rs 15 but for Rs 20.

Our sources informed that official instructions are being issued to sell the miniature sheet at Rs 15 each. However no instructions have so far been issued even after 10 days of the issue.

Postal Administrations' job is to sell the stamps at face value and not at 300% or 400% of the face value. International Philatelic Federation (FIP) calls those issues as "Abusive Issues" where the surcharge or the premium charged by the postal administration exceeds 50% of the face value. Such issues are black listed and are debarred from exhibitions under FIP rules. This is also against the norms of Good Philatelic Practice by Universal Postal Union (UPU) and World Association for the Development of Philately (WADP). This looks particularly awful as India was President of FIP for 8 years and Chairman of WADP for 5 years.

India Post's innovation continued unabated and another miniature sheet on 19th Commonwealth Games 2010 New Delhi was issued on October 18, 2008. The Brochure accompanying this issue mentions the price of the miniature sheet as Rs 15. This miniature sheet was printed by India Security Press Nasik and the label on the packet records that the miniature sheet actually contains a set of 2 stamps in the denomination of Rs 5 and Rs 15 and the price of the miniature sheets is calculated at Rs 20 each.

Thus India Post invented and issued the world's first Invisible stamp in the denomination of Rs 15. India Post should also get full marks for its honesty and efficiency as the post offices are accepting this miniature sheet for Rs 20 postage value even though the stamp of Rs 15 denomination remains invisible.

Suresh Kumar designed the Stamp and the First Day Cover. Alka Sharma designed the pictorial first day postmark. Brochure containing write-up and technical data was issued on the occasion. The First Day Cover and

the Brochure are priced at Rs 2 each. Security Printing Press, Hyderabad printed the stamp by wet offset in the quantities of 0.8 million each.

The First Day Cover and the Brochure are priced at Rs 2 each. India Security Press, Nasik printed the stamp by photogravure in the quantities of 3 million. The miniature sheet is printed in the quantity of 0.5 million.

COMMONWEALTH YOUTH GAMES STAMPS IN TWO SIZES

India Post issued III Commonwealth Youth Games 2008 on October 12, 2008 in Sheets of 40 Stamps - 10 strips of 4 stamps and in the Miniature Sheet. The size of all 4 stamps from the Miniature Sheet is 40 mm in height, whereas the stamps from Sheet measures 39 mm in height. Size difference is apparent and constant. This variety should be cataloged separately.

READERS FORUM <Dear Reader, Your feedback is important to us as it helps evolve the newsletter. Please send us have your thoughts and suggestions.>

RANJIT SINGH, New Delhi

I happened to visit the so-called stamp exhibition in Vivek Vihar at Delhi. I observe these stamp exhibitions in Delhi are a farce. Don't know when this exhibition was announced, when entries were invited and was there any prospectus? Your newsletter was also silent about the location of this exhibition where I did not find more than 3-4 visitors.

At India Post's Counter several stamps were not available. What I found very objectionable was the cost of Philately Day Miniature Sheet. Though it contains a postage stamp of only Rs 5 and is clearly marked Rs 15 as the value of the Miniature Sheet yet I was charged Rs 20 for each in spite of my protests. What is this? Profiteering or "black marketing" by India post? Ways the Philately department works are strange and despicable.

Its management is simply worthless. What is the use of issuing new stamps when India post cannot provide them for sale? In your newsletter you also mention that the new issues are available at all Philatelic Bureaus in India it is totally wrong.

What I cannot understand is the SILENCE of numerous philatelic clubs in India on these matters including Delhi Philatelists. I presume the secretaries or presidents of so called philatelic clubs have an axe to grind or they want to please the inefficient high ups in the philately department and remain mute spectators to all that is happening. I have never heard or read any comment from Philatelic clubs about various omissions or inaccuracies.

Why has India post stopped giving details about perforations, number of stamps per sheet, quality of paper, and printing size in Technical Details page of Brochures accompanying new issues? Only a few years back all these details were mentioned in brochures

In case you want to save and promote philately please' wake up' and do something and do not simply go on extolling the working of high ups who I presume know little about philately.

India Post has issued stamp on Philately Day on 7-10-08. Cost of stamp is Rs. 5/- but the cost of MS is Rs. 15/- . If you use MS than the postal value will be Rs. 15/- not Rs.5/-. Please clarify the matter with Department of Posts on behalf of fellow philatelists.

I am much disturbed at the way the Department of Posts is selling the Philately Day Miniature Sheet at Rs.20/- instead of Rs.15/- which is very clearly mentioned on the sheet itself.

On enquiry I was informed that they have checked it up from the Deputy Director General (Philately) as also from the Security Printing Press. As per their information this Miniature Sheet is to be sold for Rs.15 + Rs.5 = Rs.20 only.

I am sure this matter had been deliberated in the meetings of Philatelic Advisory Committee of the DOP when cost of printing of a Miniature Sheet was discussed.

The purpose of charging Rs.15/- instead of Rs.5/-, as was being done in the past, was to recover the cost of printing from the philatelists alone. Why the philatelists, who are already investing their money on purchase and stocking up the Miniature Sheet, be penalized thus?

Could you kindly use your good offices, consult members of the Philatelic Advisory Committee to bring about some clarity and throw some light on this anomaly?

ILYAS PATEL, Ahmedabad

I have learnt about this nasty business of additional pricing of Miniature Sheet the day on which it was issued. This issue has cropped

up again and philatelists are again on the receiving end. Instead of developing healthy relationship with the philatelists, this is another bolt from blue from DOP forgetting about the unresolved issues. I personally believe that instead of investing in such differential priced Miniature Sheet all the philatelists must unite and boycott it at once. Let it remain in the stock of the Department of Posts. Or otherwise, the Department of Posts must come out with a clarification that when affixed it will counted for Rs 20/- only. But this is the rarest of the rare event looking to the rude behavior of the Department of Posts so far. Looking to the proceedings, it seems that there is an organised gang working in the Department of Posts to take very adventurous decisions to hurt the sentiments of philatelists as well as to destroy the philatelic business of the Department of Posts. The truth is only known to the God alone.I hope and believe that it's time to unite and work together to lodge out protest.

R PURUSHOTHAMAN, Chennai

I find the functioning of our Department of Posts especially the Philately wing is becoming more and more curious.

The stamps officially released are not even printed. Whereas the stamps not officially released are freely available in the market at fantastic prices. Even the stamps officially printed and released are either not available on the day of release or later due to short supply. Really strange are the ways of the Philately wing. I wonder whether all these affairs are going openly with the blessings of the higher ups in the department.

Take the cases of Tortoise and the latest Festivals. The stamps were released and the miniatures were also released as per the brochure. But Miniatures are not available in any of the philatelic bureaus. No reason is given for the release or non-release.

In case of Madhu Bala and Shirdi Sai Baba, they were not available in time and later not available due to short supply. This is the reply I got when I went to Chennai Philatelic Bureau. Again the Sheetlets of Coast Guard were also not available after release. The reason stated in the Bureau was short supply. I don't know the reason behind the short supply for a particular Bureau. In Tamil Nadu itself, there was no such short supply in the Coimbatore Philatelic Bureau. Will the authorities look into the matter and ensure proper supply of philatelic materials to Chennai Philatelic Bureau. As the short supply was reported in the particular Bureau regularly, the matter needs serious attention and the supply should be made appropriately. Due to such short supply they are not able to supply sufficient materials to account holders especially in case of Miniatures and Sheetlets.

I suggest the department of posts to publish the number of stamps/sheets, Miniature sheets, FDCs. Brochures, Maxim Cards etc sent to each Bureau in their site. Similarly the Bureaus should also display the stock received and available on every day basis. Data on the number of active accounts should also be displayed.

Will the authorities look into the matter and do the needful in the interest of the philatelists. I hope your magazine will take up the matter seriously and do something for the philatelists who are taking the same as hobby. There may be a number of people to support the cause of the traders and I write this to your journal hoping that you would give your earnest support to philately for philatelists.

SWAPAN CHAKRAVORTY,

As I am getting engrossed to philately day by day, a dismal feeling about the appearance of average stamps of India starts inflicting in me. I have observed that the used stamps of India become lack-luster, faded and unattractive with the passage of time. Whereas, even, stamps of other not-so-rich countries e.g. Bhutan, Malta, Bangladesh, Nicaragua, etc. remain exchange-worthy for quiet a significant length of time.

I tried to explore the reasons. The mention-worthy reasons are 1) Quality of base paper 2) Pigment 3) Glossy, waterproof lacquer-like top coat 4) Smudged-up hand stamping instead of thin lined machine cancelling 5)Rigorous handling treatment on transit.

How to proceed further for corrective action in this regard?

This is with reference to the new postage stamp released by India Post of Post office (In Hindi DAK GHAR) where the printed price on miniature sheet is Rs.15/- but it is sold by philatelic bureau at Rs.20/. When I asked them why it is sold at Rs.20/- then they say we got order to sell this miniature sheet at Rs.20/- only. When I asked to higher authority about this they say 'Do not complain to us, go and write letter to the ministry. We do not take decision, it comes from Delhi. You can complain to Delhi'.
