GREETING CARDS FOR CHRISTMAS & NEW YEAR

India Post launched a new product Greetings Card with pre-stamped envelopes wherein the stamp is exact replica of the design of the card, on September 6, 2000. A total of 32 cards mainly for Deepavali Festival were released.

Now another set of about 29 cards are being made ready for release in the second week of November 2000 for Christmas and New Year season. At the time of closing the issue we do not have the details on the number of small (priced Rs. 12) and medium (priced Rs. 15) cards in the set. We also hope for better arrangements for first day of sale and postmark facility this time.

INDEPEX-ASIANA 2000 MEETINGS

The Organizing Committee of the show will be holding a meeting at Dak Bhavan, India Post HQ, New Delhi on October 4, 2000 at 11 am. The dates of the show are just a month away, December 7-12, 2000. This is going to be an important meeting to fine-tune the details of the six-day show.

The Steering Committee of the show shall be meeting earlier on the evening of October 3, 2000 at the same venue.

ISSUE SOLD OUT ON FIRST DAY

Unprecedented low print order of 100,000 topped by a low face value of Rs.3 and the Raj Kumar Shukla Commemorative is sold out at most places on the first day of issue itself, and by next day every where else. At this stage it is not clear whether even deposit account holders will get their ordered filled in full and whether it will be available in the annual collectors pack. We gather that in dealer-to-dealer business the price being quoted was Rs. 50 while retail price shot up to Rs. 100 each within two weeks of this release.

The issue on Maharaja Bijli Pasi scheduled for November 16, 2000 release may also be in the same quantity, so if you would like to include it in your collection, be there on day 1 to buy the stamp. Forewarned is forearmed.

India Post has made good quality nicely printed T-shirts depicting the enlarged designs in full color from the set of stamps on Madhubani Paintings issued on October 15, 2000.

There are 4 different designs and the price is Rs. 95 each. The T-shirts shall be available at all philatelic bureaus shortly.

MORE ON FOREIGN POST RATES

The major restructuring in the rates of foreign post parcel rates in all categories – surface, air, surface air lifted, and EMS, became effective November 1, 2000. However in the view of the huge size of changes to be made in the database it shall not be possible for some time to use the computers at the post office counters. The articles shall be booked manually for some time.

There is a Rs. 20 charge, unchanged, on all parcels that are presented to the Customs in all categories except EMS.

We regret that we are unable report in this issue on the limits of insurance for foreign post parcels as promised in the last issue. We have conflicting reports from the post office. The International Mails branch at the India Post HQ has sent a list of new rates, country wise, with columns for weight wise rates, limit of weight, and limit of the amount of insurance. While the HQ insists there are no changes made in the limits of insurance, the postmasters at some post offices say equally strongly that there are changes. It is a long

list that requires a lot of time for careful comparison with the earlier list to arrive at any conclusion. Kindly bear with us till the next issue.

INSURANCE FOR SPEED POST

India Post will provide insurance facility for the first time to International Speed Post (EMS) articles up to Rs. 100,000 (about US\$ 2150) mainly for gold coins and ornaments, bullion, precious stones, and jewelry.

NEW STAMPS RELEASED

A definitive stamp in the denomination of Rs. 50 was released on October 30, 2000. The bicolor stamp depicts the bird – Paradise Fly Catcher. India Security Press, Nashik Road printed the issue by photogravure process on watermarked paper in panes of 50. This is the seventh stamp in the 8th definitive series – Natural Heritage. There is one FDC being used for the whole series priced at Rs. 2. Informative brochure was not issued.

On April 30, 2000 the first two stamps of the 8th definitive series in the denominations of Rs. 5 and 10 depicting Leopard Cat, and Sunderbans Tiger were issued. Next the four stamps were added on July 20, 2000 in the denominations of Rs. 0.25, 0.50, 1 and 3 depicting Black Buck, Nilgiri Tohr, Saras Crane, and Indian Otter.

There was no release ceremony held for this or earlier definitive issues. We suggest a function in collaboration with World Wild Life Fund for Nature, Bombay Natural History Society or a similar organization may be organized on the occasion of the next issue in the series.

On October 31, 2000 a stamp in the denomination of Rs. 2 was released to launch the new Special Definitive Series depicting a portrait of Sardar Vallabhbhai Patel on the occasion of his 125th birth anniversary. Rs. 2 prepays the postage on book post such as unsealed greeting cards.

The main release function was held at Ahmedabad and S S Bhandari, Governor of Gujarat released the stamp. Special functions were also held for the release at Nadiad, Gujarat, the birthplace of Sardar Patel and at New Delhi.

India Security Press, Nashik Road printed the mono-color issue by photogravure process on watermarked paper in panes of 100. No FDC and informative brochure was issued.

The Special Definitive Stamps are in use concurrently with the regular definitive series. The dates of the other two denominations in this series, Re.1 and Rs. 2 depicting Subhas Chandra Bose, and B R Ambedkar respectively, will be announced later.

Alka Sharma has designed the pictorial first day of issue postmarks.

BALLOON MAILS IN INDIA

An exhibit from the reference collection of Balloon Mails in India formed by Pulak Gupta was put up on display at National Philatelic Museum on November 1, 2000. The exhibit shall remain on the display till November 30, 2000.

The museum was inaugurated in its new convenient premises on August 17, 2000. Besides having permanent exhibits, the museum also has a section where an exhibit by an eminent philatelist would be on display. The first exhibit at the museum since the inauguration was "Beyond the Boundaries" consisting of stamps from all over the world on Indian topics, belonging to yours truly that remained on display till October 31, 2000

A SLICE OF HISTORY AT CALCUTTA GPO by Shruti Todi

Calcutta: October 28: DID YOU know what a letterbox looked like in the time of Queen Victoria? Have you ever seen a first-generation telephone? If not, you are advised to head for the Postal Museum and Philatelic Library at city G P O, celebrating its 20th anniversary this year.

The Museum, inaugurated on November 2, 1979, marking the 125th year of Indian postal services, has a collection of rare Victorian letterboxes in fancy shapes and sizes. The

canopies of the boxes range from lotus-shaped to that in the form of the British crown. There are ornamental designs and inscriptions on their bodies.

Moving ahead, one sees an array of telephones. Models range from the box-type to the gecko phones. There's the magneto box-type phone, an advanced machine in 1920, and the American special-type auto telephone from 1945. On display are brass badges and leather belts inscribed with postal designations. The walls of the museum are covered with traffic and circuit maps dating back to the 1930s.

Showcases exhibit passbooks, order books, savings bank ledgers and journals dating back to the 19th century. There's a pair of ornamental brass scales that the department used to weigh packets and parcels and an old coin-cutter that was used to round out defective coins. There are hurricane lanterns, steel helmets and signal lights – relics of bygone era.

For those of you who find the idea of throwing bottles in the sea with messages in them romantic, there's a write-up on how the concept of the "bottle post" came about. Unknown to the Indian Post Offices, the seas are apparently full of messages and letters floating about in glass receptacles like wine and milk bottles. The museum also gives information on the mail runners. Extensively employed in the pre-British period, the mail runner was thought to be the most reliable and fastest means of exchanging messages.

The Philatelic Library has a large collection of stamps, brass tokens and books on philately. The walls are covered with war and defence medals that tell the glorious tale of the Army Postal Service. There's a well-preserved collection of invaluable postcards and envelopes.

The Postal Museum and Philatelic Library is not very popular with Calcuttans or tourists. One reason could be the lack of proper maintenance. Labels are missing from most exhibits, those that exist are in faulty language.

It's a pity, for the collection, though not enormous, houses a number of interesting and invaluable articles from the past. Although the Museum and Library was constructed to promote the study of postal history and philately, the public's lack of awareness has stood in the way of realization of the project. A photo gallery has been added this year to introduce a new element of interest.

"We don't have too many visitors because people don't know much about this place. And due to lack of public funds, we are unable to promote the Museum"

READERS FORUM

Ashok Bayanwala from Ahmedabad has appealed to India Post for immediate withdrawal from sale a greeting card with accompanying pre-stamped envelope that depicts the auspicious sign of swastika in reverse. Instead of facing right it faces left. This hurts the sentiments of Hindus. The sign of swastika is a symbol for Lord Ganesha who is worshipped first, before any other God, at the beginning of any and all undertakings. There is one more card in the series of 32 issued on September 6, 2000 that depicts swastika correctly.

Prakash Jambudi, also of Ahmedabad, adds, believe it or not, that there is one more error in this particular item. The stamp design on the envelope is inverted in relation to the design of the card.

It is amazing that the design is composed of not one but three swastikas in varying sizes, all in reverse, stamp design is inverted and the glaring errors was not caught at any stage and released for sale.
