## NEW STAMPS RELEASED

India Post released a commemorative postage stamp on 87<sup>th</sup> birth anniversary of Damodaram Sanjeevaaiah, a parliamentarian and a leader of masses, on February 14, 2008 in the denomination of Rs 5.

Sanjeevaiah was born in a poor family in pedapadu village in Kurnool district in present day Andhra Pradesh. He graduated from Anantpur and obtained a degree in law from Madras.

He was elected as a member of parliament in 1950. In 1952 General Elections he was elected to Madras Legislative Assembly and was appointed Minister for Housing & Cooperation. The State of Andhra Pradesh was formed in 1953 and Sanjeevaiah was mad a Minister in the first State Government. Continuing in various ministries he succeeded Neelam Sanjeeva Reddy on January 11, 1960 as the fourth Chief Minister of Andhra Pradesh. In 1964 he became a Labor Minister in the Government of India. At the time of his death on May 8, 1972, Sanjeevaiah was the President of All India Congress Committee.

Brahm Prakash designed the stamp and the First Day Cover. Alka Sharma designed the pictorial first day postmark. Brochure containing write-up and technical data was issued on the occasion. The First Day Cover and the Brochure are priced at Rs 2 each. Security Printing Press, Hyderabad printed the stamps by wet offset in the quantity 0.4 million.

RECENT SPECIAL POSTMARKS & COVERS

Feb 16: Berhampur, Azadi Express

T Ramesh, Chief of 'Azadi Express', released a special cover at Berhampur Railway Station on February 16, 2008 to mark the occasion of the arrival of the Azadi Express at the Brhamapur, Ganjam. Postal officials and philatelists were present at the release function. The cover depicts Saheed Laxman Nayak, a tribal leader who was hanged at the Berhampur Jail during the freedom struggle, flanked by Mahatma Gandhi and Netaji Subhas Chandra Bose. The special pictorial postmark depicts a line drawing of Mahatma Gandhi on the background of an Electrical Train (presumed as Azadi Express).

Venkat Rao, senior Philatelist of Eastern India Philatelists' Association and South Orissa Philatelists' Association, Berhampur(Gm)

provided the concept of the special cover and designed the special postmark.

'Azadi Express', a special train of 12 inter-connected bogies with more than 500 photographs of the pre and post-Independence era events and multimedia facilities, started its journey from New Delhi on September 28, 2007. These photographs give an opportunity to the people to peep into the first war of independence of 1857, freedom movement, Gandhian era and progress of the country since Independence. The train has already covered 22 states with halt at 75 railway stations and is scheduled to reach New Delhi on May 15, 2007.

### PROPOSAL FOR THE BUDGET

It is proposed that recommendations be forwarded to Ministry of Finance through India Post to allow Income Tax rebate on the amount spent for philatelic material. A cap of Rs 5,000 may be imposed to prevent commercial misuse. The amount should be deductible from the taxable Income and restricted to actual amount spent. As this money spent by philatelist not only get locked for 3 or 5 years but throughout life.

### ABDUL AZIZ, Varanasi

On January 29, 2008 I bought 25 Collector's Packs (17 of 2003, 7 of 1999 and one of 2002) from Varanasi Head Post Office. I was shocked to see the packing style of stamps. I opened 3-4 Packets and I found 7-10 stamps damaged, folded, torn in each and every packet. 1999 packet did not contain Personality Series stamps and missing about half of the stamps issued, and they have charged for those stamps as well. Can you do something which may improve the quality and reliability of Collector's Packs? I understand Collector's Packs are supplied from Delhi.

### JEEVAN JYOTI, Shimla

I have read the story of Nila Nayak, the mail carrier of Orissa with great interest in the review of The Last Post.

Here I want to share some of my experiences of the Post Offices of Himachal Pradesh which are located in remote areas where roads are still not available. There are some places with small population of few hundred people which are cut from the main cities and they have to travel 20-30 kilometers on foot sometimes uphill and sometimes very steep on uneven rocky path. Small post offices are located in these places with one or two workers. These areas are blocked with heavy snow during the winter season. It's very difficult to move in these places when snow becomes ice sheet which makes the path very slippery. Sometimes it is very dangerous as on one side there is always a very deep gorge. But there are mail carriers who carry mails to the nearest sub post offices in snow and rain going on foot sometimes more than 30 kilometers. The path is never straight or even. It is very difficult and sometimes on first sight it can frighten a stranger. In high winters the temperature is mostly in minus. The people living in the plain areas cannot believe this but I have seen it and experienced at these places. When my important mail is on its way I am always doubtful whether it will reach me or not. But my doubt always fails and I get my mail travelling through these places in the hands of the brave mail carriers. A thought of appreciation always comes in my mind for these stout and hard working postmen. Through this column I want to give a philatelic salute to all those mail carriers who are working in toughest hill areas of Himachal Pradesh, Uttarnchal, Jammu Kashmir and North East and helping us to receive our mail timely.

## V R RAGHAVAN,

I am an amateur thematic collector with a focus on war& warfare. I took time to visit the Chennai INPEX.I also saw with some admiration the Bridges thematic exhibit. The exhibitor had been given ample space and frames. It was an impressive exhibit. I cannot say if it merited a prize or not, since I am not an expert on bridges. I did however wonder about how a philatelic judge might assess the subject of Bridges of which he may not know much. He will apply his knowledge of Philatelic Exhibiting to a subject he knows little. I recommend that in such cases a neutral expert should be co-opted to assess the exhibit from the subject specialty point of view. The expert can be chosen locally. In the Bridges case a senior engineer with bridges background, eg from a company like Larsen & Toubro based in Chennai, would have been appropriate. Such an arrangement would have combined subject expertise with philatelic merit and would have led to an objective result.

As for the exhibition, masses of frames and exhibits were packed in a hall leaving only a two person wide lane between the frames. It was a struggle to find space to stand and admire or learn from the displays.

The postal department stalls were an absolute confusion of ill informed sales persons and insufficient supplies. To add to the confusion, hordes of school children were let loose in the exhibits area without a guide or any semblance of control. It would be better to regulate this by fixing hours exclusively for school trips.

To me and my grand children, INPEX was a learning experience despite the chaos, noise and disorganized management.

After many stamp exhibitions in India, your STAMPS OF INDIA COLLECTORS COMPANION carry letters of complaints from exhibitors relative to the level of awards rendered. Results are often compared to the level achieved at a prior exhibition. I also note that the jury not uncommonly include only postal officials, who I surmise are not necessarily philatelists, nor have they gone through the learning period jury apprenticeships?

Many complaints come from exhibitors in the Thematic Class. I am an exhibitor of nearly 40 years, earning Large Golds and Championship Class entries, showing in traditional, postal history, thematic postal stationery, aerophilately, astrophilately, and 1-frame exhibits. From this scope and level of exhibiting experience, let me say that exhibiting is not for the faint-hearted.

In my judgment, a thematic exhibit poses the most difficult to do well of all exhibiting Classes, for not only maintaining balance, but the degree of relevance of each presented item. A successful thematic exhibit must not only develop a theme, but do so through the choice of the philatelic materials drawn from as many different elements as possible. Techniques to show only relevant items must be carefully followed to avoid non-relevant diversion.

I do not claim to know the process on jury training in India, and the extent to which jury philatelic accreditation in the various Classes is followed. Show organizers can 'fix' this if it is a problem as expressed. A 1-on-1 critique at the frame will go a long way to educate both exhibitor and jury.

And when it is all said and done, the subjective component to judging is not overcome by numerical expression. One hopes that such variation is minimized by the judging team approach.

My hope is that these important issues will be responsibly carried forward, so that exhibitor participation at philatelic exhibitions will be encouraged.

### ATISH KUMAR JAIN, Kottayam

I also agree with views of Mr. Abhai Mishra regarding his views of having written test for JURORS.

He is right in the way that Jurors should have at least 25% of knowledge of the theme which he is judging.

I had also complaints regarding hopeless way of judging done at INPEX 2008.

I would rather call these Jurors "BUNCH of JOKERS" as once Mohinder Amarnath had call to the cricket selectors.

Many times I had also thought of expressing my anger thru your esteemed website but every time I thought "what is the use of whistling in front of these deaf Jurors"

Mine was ERRORS collection which they had judged within five minutes. They had not seen the rarity errors, they had not seen my classification of errors which I had done, they just did their work because they had to finish their work.

Also, the critic session was not held for criticizing but it was in fact for praising the jurors' work.

Because to major questions put up by exhibitors including me, reply was a constant "meet separately after the critic session".

When I met my Juror after the session, I was given the reason for my low performance that I had displayed some "BANNED ITEMS". On verification of my frames by two "LEARNED JURORS" there was no banned item in my collection.

I had noticed that some of the collection had displayed Gandhi stamps which are declared by UPU as illegal issues from KRYGSTAN, TCHAD, etc. One of Gandhi collection had been awarded Vermilion for displaying such items.

My question is that in a democratic country like ours-is the rule of game different for different people?
