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JHINGANS JOTTINGS

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The stamp commemorating Dr T N Nair that was scheduled for release on September 17, 2008 was finally made available at most philatelic bureaus after a week's delay on September 25, 2008.

We have noticed that the delay occurs particularly in stamps printed by Security Printing Press, Hyderabad. We recall that the first such incident was Indian Air Force issue of 2007 where only 2 out of 4 stamps were available on the day of issue and complete set of stamps and miniature sheet was made available after about a month's delay. This year the feat was repeated with Madhav Institute of Technology & Science issue where the stamp was available after about 5 weeks delay. Recently 2 stamps of Coast Guard issue as well as 5 different sheetlets were not available on the day of issue - August 12 while they were printed and ready in May 2008!

India Post must realize that situations like this provide opportunities for unscrupulous operators to sell these at exorbitant prices taking advantage of the delays. These persons corner the stamps from the place where they were ceremoniously released and were made available in small quantity on the day of issue. These are also the same persons that manipulate the market by spreading rumors such as 'a stamp is being withdrawn' to hike the sale price and 'a stamp is being reprinted' to crash the market. This kind of rumor mongering could recently be seen particularly in Madhubala and Sai Baba issues.

India Post can ensure the availability of new stamps on the date of issue in sufficient quantities at least at all the philatelic bureaus by better management of resources and logistics.

LONDON 2010 FESTIVAL OF STAMPS An international stamp Exhibition 'LONDON 2010 - Festival of Stamps' will be held from May 8 to 12, 2010 at London, UK. This is a world exhibition under the patronage of International Philatelic Federation (FIP). There will be some 2400 competitive frames available, comprising 1200 frames on show from 8 to 11 May, with the exhibits then changed for a different 1200 frames from 12 to 15 May.

LONDON 2010 includes the following competitive classes: Traditional Philately, Postal History, Philatelic Literature, Postal Stationery, Thematic Philately, Aerophilately, and Revenues. There will also be a Youth Philately Class (one frame only), and also a One Frame Class which will be restricted to King George V philately and related material. As 2010 will be 100 years since the accession of King George V, some of the focus will be on philately of that reign.

VIEWS & OPINIONS

WHAT IS THIS, WHY DEGRADATION By Naresh Agrawal, Bilaspur

There is a system of District Level, followed by State or Circle level, then National level and then International or World level philatelic exhibitions in so called ascending order of their superiority. In one of my previous articles, I had mentioned that there is no competition amongst the participants of these exhibitions which probably was not digested/considered appropriate as no reaction was received from anybody. Well, I still think the same and re-iterate the same.

Further, I am more concerned with the fact that some of the exhibits which have already won specific score/grade/medal/rank/award (AWARD) in particular level of exhibition cannot get a lower award in the

subsequent exhibition of the same level. In the recently concluded National Level Philatelic Exhibition lots of complaints were received regarding lowering of the award which has already been won by the same exhibit. HOW CAN IT BE?

I simply ask the organizer and the judges that: 1. Once an answer sheet is adjudged / checked and marks given cannot be given lower marks if re-checking is not done immediately. But once the marks are established cannot be lowered or bettered in future.

2. The exhibits are adjudged independently within the set frame work of marks awarding system as is done in case of educational system in India. The marking is not done comparatively (in comparison with other participants). If it is done, then there is no use of this system. In fact, what I want to state that once an exhibit is judged by accredited jury and given particular marks ,cannot be lowered subsequently in future at same level of exhibition. Only if the changes made in it are such that those changes only really lowers the quality of the exhibit, which normally is not the case because exhibitor always tries to enhance the quality of exhibit by putting good items so that the exhibit is improved and in that case only better result is expected and not even the same.

Yes, at higher level than that, there are chances of lowering of award because judging parameters are different and tough at higher level.

So, the matter is of serious concern that why the awards are lowered in subsequent exhibition of the same level. Even if the jury changes because the level of exhibit has already been established, has to be adjudged only for better award and not for the lower award.

This means

1. In a particular exhibition there can be 90 Gold medals awarded to 90 participants at particular level / category/ class, because the judgment is not biased, comparative and is absolutely independent.

2. No exhibit which has already been awarded any specific award at that level of exhibition can be awarded lower medal. The exhibitor may be asked to provide a photocopy of the exhibit showing standard of the exhibit during the last award won. In that case the consideration to be given to award higher prizes, if suitable.

3. This degradation is only done because of financial constraints mainly cost involved in making medals. This system of awarding medals should be changed. During exhibition only certificates should be awarded. Later such medals can be sent or alternate methods can be derived.

4. In fact, this so called Gold medal, Silver medal are Gold Grade, Silver Grade because judgment is nothing but gradation/valuation of an approved exhibit displayed.

I conclude by saying that there is no competition in competition class of philately and further no exhibit can be degraded in subsequently in the same level of exhibition. Alternate methods can be devised BUT No participant should be deprived the genuine award

I agree with him on its first part. Certainly, it is very convenient to view the exhibitions sitting in our room, without spending so much time, money etc. etc.

But online competitive philatelic exhibitions are not advisable. Because so much frauds will took place. For example, with the help of a computer I can make a good exhibit without owning a single stamp or stationery. I need only the knowledge to copy and paste the images of stamps and stationery from different philatelic web sites. Thus world's rarest stamp or cover will take its position in my exhibit.

Another thing is without sending the exhibits by competitors, how can a jury examine a particular item whether it is a fake or genuine one. I think, through computer screen it is impossible.

So in my opinion, award won exhibits from different parts of the world should be exhibited online. It will be a great help for philatelists especially budding philatelists.

This is with reference to the following para in your Jhingan's Jottings issue 359: "In a surprise departure from the tradition of 60 years since independence, for the first time, on Thegarayar stamp his name was

inscribed with his knighthood title 'Sir' from the British Empire. A beginning in this regard was made with the previous issue of Bismillah Khan where Ustad, an honorific title, was prefixed to the name."

Well in 1999 we had a stamp mentioning the Honorary prefix USTAD in Ustad Allauddin Khan Saheb's stamp & again in 2000 with Ustad Hafiz Ali Khan's stamp.

So the practice is there ...well we have to check whether it has appeared before that or not...but for sure Ustad Bismillah Khan is not the Beginning of this things...nice that you mentioned this in your jottings, hence it struck me coz it was in the back of my mind that we had the prefix 'Ustad' mentioned before....also taking the subject further I think it is proper to have the honorary titles of personalities to be printed on the stamp as it is , they deserve to be refered by their name prefixing the honorary title and it also passes correct information to the collector.
