NEW STAMPS RELEASED

India Post released set of 3 stamps and a miniature sheet on October 7, 2008 on Festivals of India. The stamps in the denomination of Rs 5 feature Dussehra Festival of Mysore, Dussehra Festival of Kolkata, and Deepavali Festival.

Vijayadashami also known as Dussehra is a festival celebrated in varying forms across India. It is celebrated on the tenth day of the bright fortnight (Shukla Paksha) of the autumn month of Ashvin or Ashwayuja, and is the grand culmination of the 10-day annual Navratri (nine nights) festival. Navratris are celebrated with much fervor by fasting on all nine days and worshipping the Mother Goddess in her different forms.

The underlying tradition and mode of celebration vary vastly by region. However, all festivities celebrate the victory of the forces of Good over Evil. It is considered an auspicious day to begin new ventures in life.

The festival commemorates the victory of Rama, prince of Ayodhya and an incarnation of Vishnu, over Ravana, the ruler of Lanka. Rama killed Ravana on this day. The festival is celebrated with much gusto and huge fetes are organized where the effigies of Ravana is burned signifying the victory of good over evil, brings the festivities to a colorful close. The Ramlila, an abridged dramatization of the Ramayana (Story of Rama) is enacted with much public fervor during the period of the festivities.

A lesser-known tradition associated with the Dussehra festival relates to the Mahabharata, specifically to the one year incognito exile period the Pandavas underwent following a preceding 12 year vanvas, or forest exile, that was imposed on them. Disguise being indispensable, they found it necessary to lay aside the many divine and distinctive weapons that they possessed. They secreted these in a 'Shami' tree (Prosopis spicigera) near their incognito residence. When the year ended, they returned to the spot, found their weaponry intact, and worshiped (in thanksgiving) both the Shami tree and the Goddess Durga, presiding deity of strength and victory. Meanwhile, the Kauravas had invaded that area, suspecting the residence of the Pandavas there. Upon finishing their devotions, the Pandavas made straight to battle, and won the contest comprehensively.

Durga puja is regarded as the most important festival of Bengal. The city of Kolkata dresses up in a new look for the five days of the festival. The celebration begin from Maha Shashti (the sixth day) and end with Bijoya dashami (the tenth day). The design of the stamp features Durga puja. In Kolkata it is known as Bijoya dashami and not Dussehra as incorrectly inscribed on the stamp.

The legend associated with the Shami tree finds commemoration during the renowned Navaratri celebrations at Mysore, which otherwise strongly emphasizes the Durga legend, as may be expected in the city built at the very site of the events of the Durga legend. On Vijaydashami day, at the culmination of a colorful 10-day celebration, the goddess Chamundeshwari is worshipped and then borne in a Golden Ambari or elephant-mounted throne, in a grand procession, through the city of Mysore, from the historical Mysore Palace to the Banni Mantapa. Banni is the Kannada word for the Sanskrit Shami, and Mantapa means "Pavilion".

Deepavali is virtually India's a national festival, and is enjoyed by most Indians regardless of faith. It is celebrated by Hindus, Jains and

Sikhs across the globe as the "Festival of Light," where the lights or lamps signify victory of good over the evil.

In North India, it is the homecoming of Lord Rama after a 14-year exile in the forest. The people of Ayodhya (the capital of his kingdom) welcomed Rama by lighting rows (avali) of lamps (deepa), thus its name, Deepavali, or simply shortened as Diwali. Southern India marks it as the day Lord Krishna defeated the demon Narakasura. In western India it is also in honor of the day King Bali went to rule the nether-world by the order of Vishnu. In Jainism it marks the nirvana of Lord Mahavira. On this day the Sixth Guru of Sikhs, Guru Hargobind, was freed from imprisonment along with 52 Kings whom he had arranged to be released as well. Sikhs greeted the Guru by lighting lamps at Amritsar when he visited Golden Temple after his release.

Unfortunately the Hindi inscription on the stamp carries the wrong spelling of Deepavali.

Brahm Prakash designed the Stamp and the First Day Cover. Alka Sharma designed the pictorial first day postmark. Brochure containing write-up and technical data was issued on the occasion. The First Day Cover and the Brochure are priced at Rs 2 each. India Security Press, Nasik printed the stamp by photogravure in the quantities of 3 million each. The miniature sheet is printed in the quantity of 1 million.

READERS FORUM <Dear Reader, Your feedback is important to us as it helps evolve the newsletter. Please send us have your thoughts and suggestions.> DISCOLOURATION OF STAMPS DURING AND AFTER THEIR SEPARATION FROM THE BACK-PAPER By Dr Avinash B Jagtap, Binningen (Switzerland)

In the last issue of Stamps of India Collectors Companion (NO. 361, October 01, 2008), in the Readers forum, Dr. Hemant Kulkarni, of Milwaukee, USA, has mentioned his observations and difficulties in separating stamps from the back-paper to which they are affixed. Since most of the philatelists and stamp-collectors come across this difficulty, I shall like to write a few lines in order to overcome this dilemma.

Usually we collect stamps by cutting them out from a large piece of paper of an envelope or a wrapper, care being taken that no damage is done to the stamps. The paper, to which stamps are affixed, is either white or coloured. Most of the colours used in the manufacture of paper have tendency to impart colouration to the water in which pieces of coloured papers are immersed. If a heap of tit-bits of paper, with stamps affixed to them are put in water for about half an hour or more, the oozing out colour may discolour the stamps and render them useless for collection. The bleeding of colour is accelerated by using lukewarm or warm water. So the first precaution to be taken is to separate the stamps affixed to the white paper from the coloured ones.

Most of the wrappers and large size envelopes which are used for sending mail from India to foreign countries (and also within India) are usually brown, brownish-orange in colour. Even in the rainy season the colour of the wrapper would impart its colour to the stamps affixed on it. The collectors are advised, whenever possible, to instruct their senders to use white envelopes or wrapper only.

This colouration difficulty has been observed not only in case of envelopes and wrapper sent abroad from India, but also in case of large size envelopes of orange-yellow coloured paper from Switzerland and also that gaudy red coloured envelopes used by Americans in sending their greeting-cards.

Another possibility is that the sender pastes a white coloured paper onto the envelope or a wrapper and affixes his stamps only onto this white paper. The receiver can peel off this white paper along with the stamps affixed to it and immerses this piece of paper in water. In doing so the possibility of oozing out of colour from the original coloured envelope or wrapper is effectively avoided.

It must be mentioned that the Indian stamps (especially the definitive with higher denominations) bear an inferior quality and quantity of adhesive on their back and to overcome this deficiency there is a tumbler full of typical blue coloured glue in Indian post-offices. The customers lavishly make use of this glue, so that when the stamps affixed to the paper with this bluish-white glue are immersed in water, the stamps could be freed from the paper underneath, but not necessarily from the shabby bluish gum! The instructions like "Moisten thoroughly and Press firmly" on the margin of the stamp sheet does not improve the performance of the stamps!
