Kalka Shimla Railway is one of the 4 Mountain Railways of India that includes Darjeeling Himalayan, Ooty, and Matheran. A stamp was issued on November 9, 2003 on Kalka Shimla Railway Centenary. Mountain Railways of India are already a UNESCO World Heritage and it was extended to include Kalka Shimla Railway on July 7, 2008. A Special Postmark and Special Cover were issued to mark this new status on November 9, 2008. About 50 special covers were carried on is 105<sup>th</sup> anniversary run from Shimla to Kathleeghat.

Keeping in view the horrible and detestable working and management of Philately department of India Post (which may now be called South India Post), where is the necessity of issuing unwanted and unnecessary stamps??

You publish list after list of 'forthcoming stamps' but the stamps are either not available or are postponed. Something is always missing, FDCs, Brochures or even stamps on the day of issue.

My foreign contacts simply do not believe this. Some have even stopped collecting India stamps.

The management of India Post philately department has proved itself as totally worthless and one wonders how these inept officers are still in their posts. It seems the minister and the departments of posts are interested only in flooding the markets and thrusting stamps on south Indian subjects and personalities only. Six stamps issued on 31st December, 2008 related to south Indians only, Isn't India Post promoting regionalism in Philately?

Why couldn't they issue stamps on Gurta Gaddi divas of Guru Granth Sahib? Isn't it dishonour? Special coins are however being issued.

India Post is promoting 'black marketing' in stamps. Sometimes they sell same Miniature Sheet for Rs 20 and sometimes at Rs 15. Who pockets this extra money extracted from stamps collectors??

Do we have a philatelic policy worth the name?

It is sad to note that all these so called philatelic clubs seem to be mute spectators to the state of affairs. I presume their presidents or secretaries may be getting some sort of patronage or 'perks' from India Post. They should have the courage to speak up.

HISTORY OF POSTAL COMMUNICATIONS IN INDIA By Sangeeta Deogawanka

Part 11 - POST MEDIEVAL INDIA (1500 to 1818 A.D.) Provincial Dynasties & Regimes

The Post Medieval period in India spanning three centuries from 1526 to 1818 A.D., witnessed an era of fragmented power centres throughout the country. This continued in spirit despite episodic annexations to the Mughal kingdom. The reign of Muhammad Tughlaq in particular, witnessed the break-out of rebellions leading to the establishment of independent states and dominions.

These states had well defined groups. The first group of the Hindu states of Rajasthan was led by Mewar. The second group was formed by the States of Gujarat and Malwa. The third in the south consisted of the Muslim Bahamanis and the Hindu empire of Vijayanagar, while the fourth comprised of the kingdoms of Gondavana, Orissa, Bengal and Jaunpur.

POSTAL SYSTEMS IN THE HINDU STATES OF RAJASTHAN Traditionally, Rajputana is the upshot of the valiant efforts of tribes like the Gujjars, Naths, Meenas, Jats, Bhils and Ahirs. As for the Rajputs, a royal warrior dynasty, they resisted Muslim incursions initially. Eventually however, many of the Rajput kingdoms became subservient to the Delhi Sultanate and the Mughal Empire during the latters' expansive ventures.

While the State of Mewar defied Muslim rule, there were others like Amber who were the trusted allies of the Mughals. On the verge of asserting independence from the Mughals in the 18th century, Rajputana came under the assault of the Marathas and PIndaris. Centuries of political turmoil and consequent emptying of the royal coffers, saw the Rajput Kings of these Western States accept British sovereignty against the assurance of local autonomy. Treaties were thus concluded with the British in early 19th century.

The postal history of Rajputana would be incomplete without the mention of the various private postal systems in operation. Most importantly, the Brahmini Dak and Mirdha Dak, both of which existed much prior to the State Posts and the Imperial Post.

The Postal System in the state of Marwar was handled by the family of Mirdhas of Jodhpur. "The historic association of the family of Mirdhas of Rajasthan with development and maintenance of Postal services in different parts of Mughal Empire has been traced to the halcyon days of Akbar the Great."<sup>1</sup> The earliest mention is found in 1584 A.D. when Raja Uday Singh of Jodhpur, under the orders of Akbar, marched to Gujarat and defeated Sultan Muzzafar in battle.

The Mirdhas, a Jat community, were accorded royal sanction for carriage of mail, with the grant of a silver rod, attached with small bells. The routine mail was carried by the Sargara community delivered to the village officials while other sects were employed for missives of the common people. When horse couriers were used, they were known as Qasids (during the Mughal period). A post-house or dak chowki operated at a distance of every 10 kos. These mail carriers and post-houses were supervised by the head messenger who reported to a Mirdha.

The horse couriers could cover distances of 50 to 70 miles a day during times of emergency. The Mirdhas were also conferred the title of 'Ghoda Qasids', 'Ghoda' meaning horse.

The routes serviced by the Mirdha Dak stretched in the West to Lahore, Peshawar and Kabul. Jodhpur was well networked with Bikaner and Delhi in the North and Bundi in the East. Godwar or Chandravati kingdom was connected through Sirohi and Mt. Abu. The routes traversed through the city of Sojat close to Jodhpur, to connect Ahmedabad and other parts of Gujarat and Burhanpur to the South.

The Mirdha Dak system was well organized by the middle of 18th century, during the rule of Raja Bakht at Jodhpur. For Nagaur and other places, mail was often delivered through carrier-pigeons. Priority mail was handled by the Avval Mirdhas Dak<sup>2</sup>.

With the decline of the Mughal empire, Nadir Shah's invasion and the emergence of Maratha power, there followed a period of uncertainty amongst the power centres. There was total disruption of postal communication. Private mail runners were slain and dak looted by freebooters. Need was felt to use a safe conduit for communication. This is where the indigenous Brahmini Dak stepped in.

The Brahmins, who occupied the upper echelons of the Hindu social structure, were held in high esteem by Hindus, who are inherently Godfearing and pious. It was perceived that fear of invoking the wrath of the Gods, would hold in bay any pernicious intention towards them. Moreover, Brahmins frequently traveled to holy places and had universal access. The Marathas and local tribes too held the Brahmins in great regard. They were thus considered safe carriers of messages.

The practice of using Brahmins as postal carriers was first initiated by Keshoram Sharma, a Gour Brahmin of Khetri sometime in the 18th century. The Brahmins traveled from village to village on foot, camel and horses. Unlike the Mirdha dak system, where the Mirdhas essentially occupied the supervisory or managerial status, the Brahmins herein were themselves the postal messengers.

During this period there also existed several other private dak systems, operating simultaneously in the States of Rajputana, stretching beyond these precincts to entire North and North-Western India. They were sometimes referred to as Nawabi services or Dak , operating from time to time, directly or vide subsidiaries under special arrangement. There were also the Dak systems named after their founders, like the Seth Ram Dak and the Mungee Ram Dak which operated from Ajmer to Kotah, via Kekri, Sawar, Jahajpur and Bundi. .Also the Humaram Dak, which served the routes through Pali to Bhawani via Jodhpur, Ajmer and Shekhawati. The Buldeo dak operated from Ajmer to Jaipur.

The baniyas or local businessmen had a random system wherein messengers brought them news of business trends and prices. In Shekhawati kingdom, baniyas devised a system of flashing messages about prices across hills, which was referred to as the chilka ka dak. A mirror was used during the day and flashes of gunpowder at night. This evolved as the Chilka dak in early 1700s, stamped often with hand-drawn symbols.

The business classes also maintained an organised dak system called the Mahajani dak, patronised by the well-established individuals and merchants called mahajans.

The Maharajas of Mhow and Jhansi also had their private dak, carrying both the State correspondence and the private mail of people. The Chaturbhuj Vyas's Brahmini Dak, which serviced the postal lines between Jodhpur and Jaisalmer, finds special mention as the mail was carried only on camel. This developed as the camel post.

However, no markings were used on the mail carried by these private postal operators, during this period. In 1818, the British gained control over Marwar through a treaty they signed with King Chatar Singh. Yet, even after this the various Dak systems continued to operate as before.
